The Great Northern Announces
the Inauguration of a
Novel Plan.

Portland, Ore., Feb. 22.—The Great Northern Railway, through President Louis R. Hill, announces the inauguration of a plan of advertising the resources and assisting in the colonization of the Pacific northwest which is today meeting with much favorable comment in this city. Mr. Hill proposes furnishing eastern people with a list of what is produced in the far western states. To this end, representatives of the Great Northern Company are now in this state compiling information. They are in search of choice fruit and grain samples produced in Oregon to be added to the exhibit now being made in the east from Washington, Montana and Oregon.

A passenger coach is to be fitted with samples of the products of the Pacific northwest which will next year be sent over the various eastern railroad systems, affording people living along the lines an opportunity to see at first hand what the West has to offer in the way of inducements for settlers.

STILL FIGHTING

Sedwick Post No. 10, G. A. R., Department of Oregon, at its last meeting passed resolutions on the action of congress granting to an association of ex-Confederate soldiers in Alabama, the privilege of using tents belonging to the United States government at a reunion to be held at Mobile.
