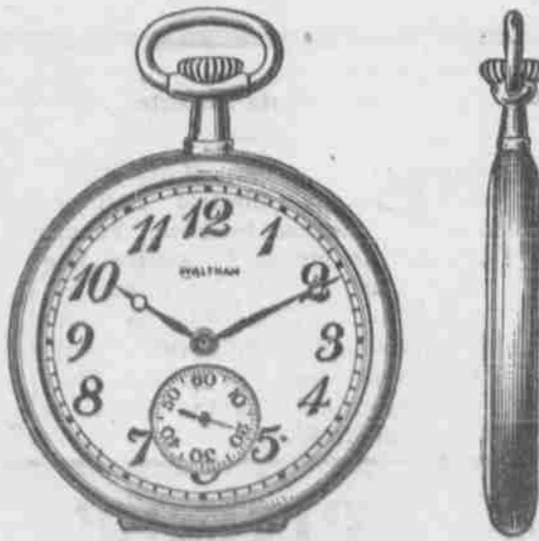

PASADENA, CAL., WILL RECEIVE ONE-TENTH

Pittsburg, Pa., March 7.—Pasadena, Calif., is to receive one-tenth of Andrew Carnegie's recent "education" gift of \$3,000,000, according to an announcement here today.

The \$3,000,000 was to be divided among ten municipalities named by the steel king each, to receive \$300,000. The interest on the gifts was to be used for educational purposes. The school authorities and teachers in each city were to determine its disposition.
