DIES SUDDENLY ALBANY

MRS. M. E. HOLCOMB DROPPED DEAD WHILE SITTING AT BREAKFAST TABLE.

Mrs. M. E. Holcomb, one of the oldest and most respected residents in South Salem, died suddenly, while sitting at the breakfast table this morning, heart failure being the cause. Mrs. Holcomb was born in McHenry county, Ill., in 1854, from where she removed to Oregon and has been a resident of this city for the past 30 years. A kind and loving disposition has won her many friends in this city who will be grieved to learn of her untimely death.

Mrs. Holcomb was the mother of two children, Chas., now living in Salem, and Etta, who is now dead. The husband and father passed away several years ago.

The deceased appeared to be in good health this morning until she was attacked with a dizziness. Herself and son, Charley, were eating breakfast, when Mrs. Holcomb suddenly complained of a blindness, and after sitting rigid for about five minutes, fell forward on the dishes and soon expired. Charley called in Dr. O. E. Miles as quickly as possible, but life had become so extinct that the physician could do nothing. Funeral announcements will arrive later.

APPEAL TAKEN An appeal has been taken from the court of Judge Webster to the circuit court in the case of J. M. Forrest against E. Chalcraft.

This suit was commenced in the Justice court by the plaintiff for the purpose of securing damages for the breaking of his buggy. He alleged in his complaint that the defendant is superintendent of the Chemawa Indian school, and that on a certain day he permitted an Indian boy to take members of the school for a ride on the Portland-Salem road, and that, in passing the plaintiff, the driver of the wagon, through carelessness, run into the buggy of the plaintiff and broke a wheel, and otherwise damaged it. A verdict was of damages amounting to \$22.50 was given the plaintiff, but it was not satisfactory, and an appeal was taken.

BUSINESS MEN KICK

A communication has been received by the Railroad Commission from a number of the business men of the city of Albany, protesting against the proposed raise of the freight rates between Portland and that city by the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, and asking that an investigation be made.

According to the complaint filed by the business men, the Southern Pacific recently decided to raise the price on Eastern shipments, by making the local rate apply to them instead of the present 10-cent rate. The signers of the complaint state that such a rate would be unreasonable and exorbitant, and asks the commission to hold a hearing on the matter, and to issue an order restraining the company from putting the rates into effect.

The complaint is signed by S. E. Young & Son, Ralston Electric Supply Company, W. B. Stearns & Company, Chambers & McCune and L. E. M. J. Hamilton.
