INTEREST IN SERVICES INCREASES

SINGING AND INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC ARE BOTH FINE—SUBJECT LAST NIGHT WAS "LOVE," TONIGHT "JUSTICE."

Interest is unflagging at the tabernacle, another fruitful service was held last night. The chorus choir, in its usual entertaining way, opened the way of the meeting, and the Rev. Mr. Gordon, of Albany, led the congregation in prayer. The ministers' quartet, the personer of which is Revs. Erratt and Selbeck, bases; Babcock and Lovall, tenors, was in evidence at this meeting and rendered a beautiful selection entitled "The Wayside Cross." So well were they received that they were compelled to answer to an encore, and responded with "Where Will You Spend Eternity?" They will sing again this evening.

Mr. Taylor made a few brief remarks upon the necessity of more publicity. Mrs. Taylor and Mrs. Wegner favored the audience with a selection before the topic of the evening was taken up. The subject of Mr. Taylor's address was "Love," taking his text from John 3:16: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." "There is enough truth in this one verse," said the speaker, "to give the entire world. I gave, I gave my life for thee, what next thou given for me." He pictured the love of a mother for her son, the sacrifices she would make for him, and then applied it to Jesus Christ, who died on the cross that we might be saved. Expressed sympathy, "I wouldn't go to the express office for it. The kind of sympathy which counts is that which helps, not merely expresses it. If you love your neighbor, go and help him to Jesus. To show love of God do something. He gave his life for us, what have we done for him? The story of Calvary was then given, showing how Jesus came down and died, not merely for His friends, but for His miserable enemies, and prayed for the men that nailed Him to the cross.

"No man cared for my soul." From this he showed how of father, mother, sister, brother and all earthly friends might cast you off for your sins, and how the Lord would take you in His arms and shield you. All that is necessary is to repent and turn to Him. "We all have sinned and come short of the glory of God," God laid on us the iniquity of it all, and by His stripes we are healed. If you trust in God you are saved. He will not only save you from hell, but will save you for glory. God has done everything He could to keep man out of hell, and man has done everything he can to get in. Get your pardon; come tonight, Whosoever will. It is up to you to say I will or I won't. It is the decisive man who wins. Who can say I will. Take God's love and profit by it; spurn it and be lost.

Friday afternoon a meeting will be held in the tabernacle preparatory to the great Sunday services. Sunday afternoon Mr. Taylor will address the men only. His subject will be "Chickens Come Home to Roost." It is desired that all men in the city attend this meeting. In the First M. Bill is Still Growing.

Olympia, Wash., March 17.—The Great Northern railway is liable to the state of Washington for \$100,000 for its failure to provide a shelter shed at Velvet, Stevens county, as ordered by the railway commission in a suit on file here.

While the law provides a \$48,000 penalty to date, the state will demand only \$1000, the suit being a test case to let the railroad realize that the commission intends to enforce its orders. The order of the Great Northern was issued last August. The law provides a penalty of \$250 for each day's failure to obey.
