CANNON SAYS HE WILL NOT BE THE GOAT

Washington, March 18.—The allied Republican insurgents and Democrats this afternoon turned down three compromise propositions submitted to them by the regulars.

The first proposition was that a new rule committee be formed to number 15 members and with no prohibition against the speaker being a member of the committee.

The second was that the committee should number 15 with no prohibition against the speaker acting on the committee.

The third was that Cannon's supporters would accept the Norris resolution providing the clause aimed at the speaker be eliminated.

On their part the insurgents submitted a compromise proposition that the committee on rules be composed of 15 members and that the speaker shall retire as a member of the committee. They agree to take the promise of Cannon that he would retire and not to have that provision written in the rules.

The matter was put up to Cannon who refused to assent to the compromise proposition, saying: "That is not a compromise, and I will not be the goat."

The speaker refused to accept the advice of Dazell of Pennsylvania and Smith (Rep.) of Iowa, not to rule on the resolution and declared that he would rule today and accept the verdict of the house.
