Verse 3.—What in the last analysis, is the essential qualification for being a subject of the kingdom of God on earth? Jan. 30.—Some Laws of the Kingdom. Matt. 5:17-26, 38-48. Golden Text: Be ye therefore perfect as your father which is in heaven is perfect. Matt. 5:48.
