## ROOSEVELT ERUPTS IN NAPLES

Became Active at 8 O'clock This Morning When He Was Surrounded by Half the Citizens of the City on Landing.

### SURROUNDED BY GUARDS

Brief Speech of Thanks and Then Denounced as False an Interview Printed in Naples, Quoting Him on American Politics—Sticks to His Determination Not to Talk Politics, and Reporters Could Get No Statement From Him.

Naples, April 2.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt landed here today in Cairo, was given a reception by prominent Americans, shook hands around, made a speech, protested against a special police guard given him as a protection from members of the "Black Hand," denounced a political interview as false, reiterated his determination not to talk politics, and within the short time between the docking of the Prinz Heinrich and his arrival at the hotel, the Prinz Heinrich, bearing the name, Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Ethel and Kermit arrived here at 8 o'clock this morning.

on the quay and half of that half appeared to be Americans. All gave the American statesman an enthusiastic reception as he appeared on the deck of the Prinz Heinrich and descended the gangway. Colonel Roosevelt was met by Ambassador Leishman who had come from Rome to welcome the former president. Consul Crowninshield, stationed here the mayor of Naples, the prefect of police and other dignitaries of the Neapolitan community also were present to receive the distinguished visitor.

As soon as Roosevelt had descended from the ship he was surrounded by a special guard of police in citizens' clothes. Naples is the hotbed of secret societies and anarchistic organizations and the police used every means known to them to prevent harm to Roosevelt.

The Americans protest against having a body guard attend him but was assured that the authorities here would rest easier knowing that they had used every precaution to prevent trouble. The former president was escorted to the Excelsior hotel. One of the first things he did upon his arrival was to denounce as false, an interview printed here quoting him on American politics. Roosevelt has stuck religiously to his determination not to talk politics until he arrives home. Roosevelt made a brief speech of thanks in response to speeches of welcome by representatives of the city.

## AUTOMATIC REVOLVER IN EVIDENCE

BLOOD STAINED SKIRTS ALSO PLAY A PART IN TODAY'S TRIAL — MRS. SAYLOR CLAIMED THAT SHE FOUND THE REVOLVER.

Waukegan, Ill., April 2.—The prosecution in the Saylor murder case today sought to prove the ownership of an automatic revolver with which they believe Banker J. B. Saylor was killed, to connect Mrs. Saylor, co-defendant with her father, John Grundon and Dr. William Miller, with the murder. Ira Grundon, Mrs. Saylor's brother, was placed on the stand by the prosecution. He testified that shortly after Saylor was shot and killed Mrs. Saylor gave him the revolver, saying that she had found it.

Later a deputy sheriff took the revolver from him. The authorities have been endeavoring to ascertain to whom the revolver belongs. The state also asks permission to introduce two blood-stained skirts which the prosecutors believe will show that Mrs. Saylor was present when her husband was shot instead of running away as she claimed she did. The court reserved its decision. Godfrey Ruehl, who followed several neighbors of the Saylor on the stand, said that he saw Mrs. Saylor, one midnight, cautiously approach and enter the home of Dr. Miller.

## FRENCHMAN IS KILLED IN A DUEL

New York, March 2.—The police admitted today that they have no clue to the identity of a Frenchman who early yesterday morning fought a duel with a fellow countryman, on the East Side front, killing his adversary and escaped.

The fight was witnessed by a chauffeur who was driving past an apartment house. Shortly before he passed the entrance to the house, the Frenchmen stepped from the doorway, pistols in hand. They paced five paces each, then wheeled and fired. One of them fell, mortally wounded.

Without waiting to see what effect his bullet had had on his victim, the unwounded Frenchman quickly stepped inside the house.

The police were called, but those in charge denied that any Frenchmen resided there. The body of the dead duelist has not been identified.

## TERRIFIC CYCLONE IN AFRICA

Level of Sea Is Raised 22 Feet and Regular Tidal Wave Sweeps Inland for Miles— Hundreds Are Killed.

### AETNA A ROARING FURNACE

Is Growing Still More Active—Earthquakes Are Frequent and Explosions of Gases in the Depth of the Mountains Are Becoming More Frequent and Louder—Houses Covered With Slate to Protect Them From Burning Cinders.

Storm Downs the Wires. The wires went down shortly before noon, both to the south and between Salt Lake and Huntington, so that reports of earthquake and the terrific storm on the island of Mozambique were chopped in two considerably above the middle, and the general service was knocked clear out.—Ed.

Lisbon, April 2.—Heavy loss of life and great property damage in a cyclone is reported today along the east African coast, in a cable received here from the governor of Mozambique.

Mozambique is a Portuguese possession in East Africa. The dispatch says that the level of the sea rose 22 feet under a terrific wind, and rushed inland for many miles, inundating the country.

Scores of bodies already have been recovered from the devastated plantations and from wreckage. The extent of the storm was 100 miles of coast.

The destruction is the greatest that has occurred there in 20 years.

### MT. AETNA MORE ACTIVE.

Tremendous Lava Flow Has Already Broken All Modern Records and Flow Continues.

Catania, April 2.—The roaring furnace of Mount Aetna increased its violent activity today and the people of Catania, after many sleepless nights have become hysterical and fear ridden.

Every house is practically slated to prevent the incoming shower of ashes from sifting in. Fear of a conflagration from chance live cinders from the distant craters has added to the general alarm felt over the eruption. Occasionally earthquakes rock the island and the explosions of gases in the depths of the mountain are becoming louder. Inhabitants of the little village of Cavalleri fled for their lives during the night when the lava flow engulfed the town. Bellipasso and Borello are in the path of the flow and cannot escape destruction.

The eruption of Aetna has broken all modern records of volcanic evictions.

## BUSINESS LIVELY ON THE YUKON

Dawson, April 2.—The Yukon is awakening today. The big spring thaw has begun and the district is stretching itself preparatory to a season of activity.

The Klondike is preparing to operate 12 large dredges and a score of hydraulic plants on many individual placer properties this season. The largest new enterprise, the Treadgold, a new company, will build a ditch seven miles long from the north fork of the Klondike, carrying 15,000 inches, virtually a small river, to generate power for the lifting of water for hydraulic

purposes to high levels. One hundred and fifty tons of material, including two steam shovels, were taken to the property this week.

The Northern Light and Coal Co. is putting on large crews to complete a \$3,000,000 power plant. Twenty-five hundred tons of machinery will reach here in June from England.

The Five Finger Coal Co. is investing several millions in opening its collieries and building boats. Dawson people alone are spending \$250,000 this year in developing quartz.

### APPOINTED ON BOARD OF DENTAL EXAMINERS

Governor Benson yesterday afternoon appointed Dr. Jean Cline, of Portland, and Dr. Clyde Mount, of Oregon City, as members of the State Board of Dental Examiners, for terms of three years. Drs. Cline and Mount were officially recommended by the Oregon State Dental society, as well as by numerous other dentists throughout the state. A number of other well known dentists from different sections of the state desired appointment as members of the state board, but primarily because of the recommendation made by the Oregon Dental Society, the governor appointed Dr. Cline and Dr. Mount, both of whom are experienced and successful practitioners. Dr. Mount is a brother of Judge Wallis Mount, of the supreme court of the state of Washington.

## WISTER IS TAKEN FOR A SMUGGLER

IS MAD CLEAR THROUGH BECAUSE HE WAS HELD UP BY A CUSTOM OFFICER WHO WAS "A BEARDESS BOY."

Tucson, Ariz., April 2.—Owen Wister, author of "The Virginian," is journeying toward the Pacific coast today with wrath in his heart, and in the back of his brain a determination to inform the custom officials at Washington of the lack of perspicuity of their agents at El Paso.

When he returned from a visit to Jaurez, across the border at El Paso, late yesterday, Wister and his wife were halted by the customs officials. They were searched and were to swear that they were not opium smugglers, according to the story which the novelist afterwards told.

"And the fellow that held me up," he disgustedly declared, "was a beardless youth, who two months ago, had been a clerk in some dry goods store. I appealed to Customs Collector Sharpe, but what could he do? He was powerless to discipline the boy under the existing civil service rules. It merely shows the inefficiency of some of our essentials of administration of the revenue."

## JURY FINDS W. H. MOORE NOT GUILTY

Portland, Ore., April 2.—The jury in the Walter Moore case reported yesterday afternoon at 4:43. The report reads:

"We, the jury, find the defendant, W. H. Moore, not guilty as charged in the indictment, but recommend that he receive the most severe censure of this court for his guilty knowledge and participation in unlawful and dishonest acts relative to the conduct and management of the bank of which he was president and a director."

### Smallpox in Seattle Suburb.

Seattle, Wash., April 2.—The schools, saloons, billiard and pool rooms are all closed in Charleston, the navy yard town, because of eight cases of smallpox which have developed there. All Charleston pupils in the Union high school have been ordered to stay away from school until further notice.

## GLEASON CALLS IT A GOOD JOKE

Young Couple Married But Six Days and Held Up in Their Rooms in Broad Daylight by Pair of Bold Robbers.

### A BLONDE AND A BRUNETTE

Is the Description of the Light Fingered Gentlemen Who Tied Them in Their Chairs While Searching the Apartments—Robbers Entered Home in Broad Daylight, and, After Tying the Couple, Went Through the House.

San Francisco, April 2.—A desperate thug, designated by the police as "the big blonde," is in custody today, suspected of having committed a daylight robbery in which he, with a companion, bound their victims while they ransacked apartments and stole clothing, silverware and money.

The victims of the robbery described their assailants as a "big blonde" and a "little brunette." The police say that this is the first time in the history of robberies that they have had descriptions based on such physical characteristics. The victims were Mrs. Thomas F. Gleason, Miss Anita Gleason and Thomas F. Gleason. The robbers entered the Gleason home late yesterday afternoon. Both were masked with handkerchiefs. One held Gleason at bay with a revolver, while the other bound the women and gagged them. He used strips of valuable lace curtains, long pieces of milk cape and a chain to bind them.

Then the "brunette" searched the rooms systematically, and put in a sack everything of value that suited his fancy. Some silverware and jewelry was overlooked in the hasty raid and Gleason declares that he persuaded the "blonde" to leave his personal jewelry by representing to him the danger he and the "brunette" would be compelled to lay themselves open to in disposing of it.

"Yes, it happened on April fool's day," said Gleason later, when recounting his experience. "But it wasn't a joke from my viewpoint."

Gleason and his wife have been married but six days. The couple were married at Palo Alto last Sunday by Father Gleason, his brother.

The police attach some importance to the fact that Gleason is a cousin of Edward Gleason, who was twice the victim of the notorious drug store bandit, who operated as bodily as did the "big blonde" and "little brunette" in the Gleason home. Some of these believe that one of them may be the bandit.

## HOOK WORM IS FOUND IN CALIFORNIA

Los Angeles, Calif., April 2.—That the hookworm has invaded southern California and may gain a foothold in this section of the state was the information given the Los Angeles county medical association by Dr. Joseph M. King, who is making a complete investigation of his startling discovery today. Dr. King declared that he has diagnosed a peculiar disease that attacked S. Uriu, proprietor of a Japanese poolroom, as hookworm. Uriu came to Los Angeles from Mexico, where Dr. King believes he contracted the disease.

Dr. King declared that the sandy soil of southern California would make an excellent breeding ground for the parasites, and sounded a note of warning to the physicians of the association.
