LUMBERMAN'S ASSOCIATION IN SESSION TODAY

MADE TRIP TO FALLS CITY AND BLACK ROCK THIS AFTERNOON AND WILL BE BANQUETED IN BOARD OF TRADE ROOMS TONIGHT.

After an enthusiastic meeting in the Board of Trade rooms, and at which session much routine business was transacted, and also an interesting paper read by C. W. Thompson, of the Cascade Locks, and chairman of the committee on trade topics, the Oregon and Washington Lumber Manufacturers' Association adjourned at 11:30 o'clock this forenoon and left for an excursion trip to Falls City and Black Rock.

Interesting Meeting.

There were about 40 members in attendance at the meeting this forenoon, and they arrived in the city over the Oregon Electric some time prior to that set for the calling of the meeting. The meeting was called to order at 10:30 by President Wentworth, and the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was waived, and the members proceeded at once to transact the business before them.

The domestic fir committee submitted a report on the campaign being waged to encourage the box manufacturing industry, which was to the effect that the association should encourage the manufacturer in every way possible, and, after considerable discussion of the subject, it was referred back to the committee for further consideration, with instructions to report at a subsequent meeting.

The committee on insurance reported that it understood that there was a movement on foot to bring about a liability law—that it would probably be brought up under the initiative law this fall, and that it was understood that it was of an arbitrary character, but no action was taken in relation to it, save that it was suggested that it was a subject worthy of consideration, and which should be brought up for further discussion at some future meeting.

Thompson Reads Paper. After the reports of the committees and the transaction of some general routine business, the association listened to a paper by C. W. Thompson on the mono-rail. Mr. Thompson brought out the fact that

while machinery had been invented and put in use in all sawmill plants in every department, that the work of assorting lumber was still being done by hand, but that the mono-rail was now being brought into use in some mills, and that it was working with great success. He then described the workings of the mono-rail electric carrier, and showed how it was a time-saving as well as a money-saving machine.

Will Meet Business Men Tonight. After the meeting the members visited places of interest in the city and then departed on the 12:25 train for Dallas, Falls City and Black Rock. After visiting the mills and places of interest at these towns, places of interest at these towns, ending at 6 o'clock, when a lunch will be served by the Board of Trade, at its building, and the members be entertained by the business men of the city.

IN ORDER TO TEST THE LAW.

Fishermen of Oregon City Play a Hand Without Reckoning on What the Other Fellow Had

With the view of successfully breaking the order issued by the Board of Fish Commissioners against salmon fishing in the Willamette and Clackamas rivers, by making a test case of the matter in the justice court, where it was felt certain that an acquittal would be had, Harry Aunney, who was delegated by the fishermen of Oregon City to violate the order, was indicted yesterday afternoon by the grand jury, and will be tried for the offense by the circuit court of that place.

The order has met with the opposition of practically all of the fishing companies, and a number of the fishermen. The former recently tested the order by taking an action to the supreme court, which tribunal decided in favor of the Board of Fish Commissioners. After the decision the fishermen at Oregon City indicated that they proposed violating the order, and, looking to that end, held a meeting at that place yesterday at noon.

Warden Takes Hand.

Master Fish Warden McAllister and his deputies learned of the movement, and decided to take a hand in the game, and were present at the meeting. They also learned that the fishermen intended to delegate one of their number to violate the order, under the belief that a warrant for his arrest would be issued in the justice court, where they were satisfied an acquittal would be had, and

hoped in this way to successfully break the order.

McAllister and his men, however, turned the tables on the fishermen, as, when they arrested Aunney for a violation of the order, instead of taking him before the justice of the peace, they went before the grand jury, which was in session, and which body, after listening to the evidence submitted, returned an indictment against Aunney.

The penalty for the offense is a fine of not less than \$50 and not more than \$1000. No other violations have been made, and Mr. McAllister expressed it as his opinion this morning that there would be no further violations.
