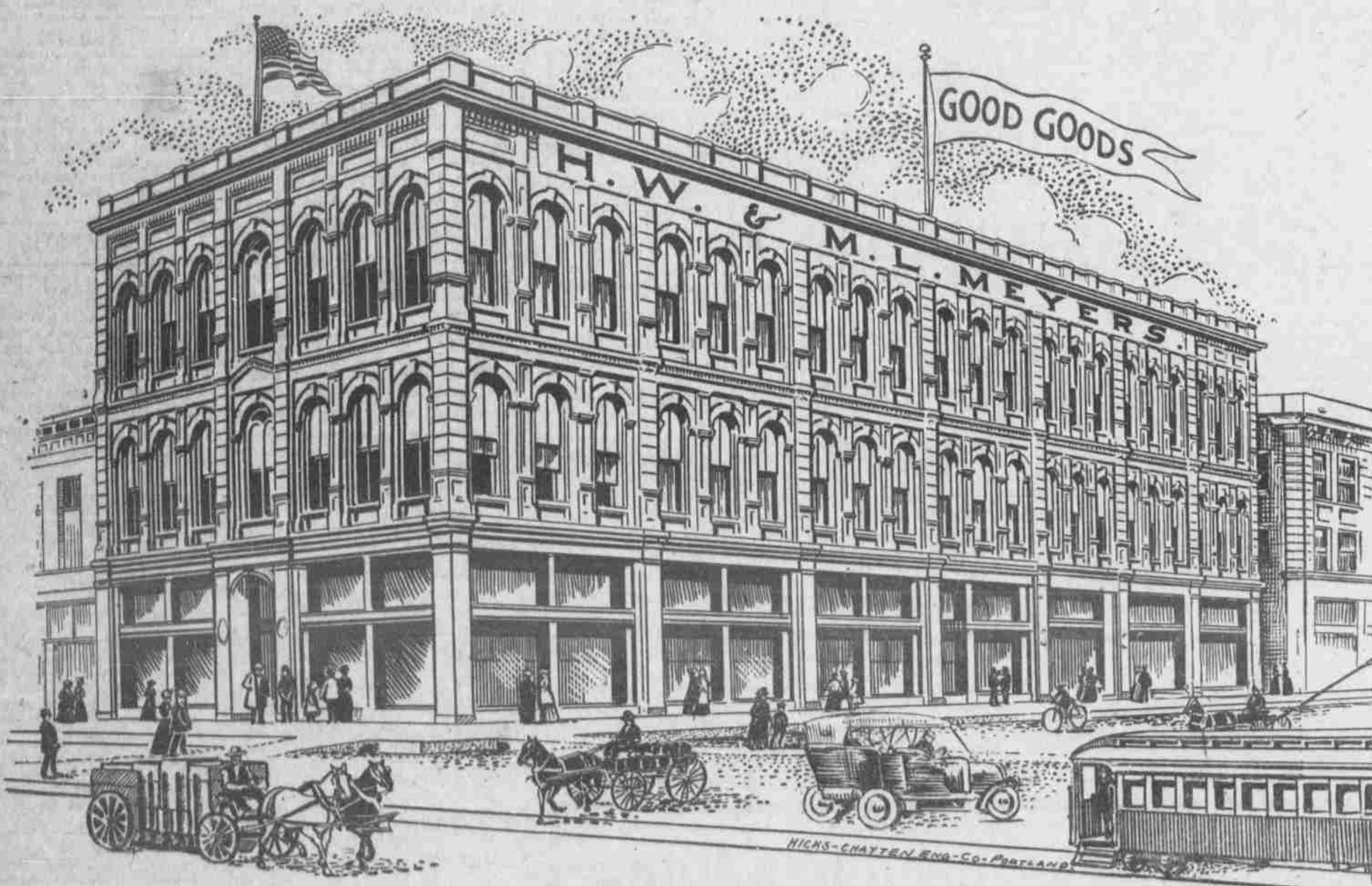

Charged With Rape.
 A warrant charging statutory rape has been preferred against Verle Goode in the court of Judge Webster, and the time for his preliminary examination was set for this afternoon, but the indications were, at a late hour, that the case would be either continued over, or that the examination would be waived.
 The complaint against Goode is preferred by J. G. Kilpack and the offense is alleged to have been committed on the person of Devina Dryden, who, it is alleged, is under 16 years of age, in September, 1909. The girl, according to her own testimony, submitted to the district attorney's office, is now in a state of pregnancy, and is in charge of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, in Portland. According to this testimony it would also seem that she is over 16 years of age, in which event an action for rape could not be maintained under the Oregon laws, unless the element of force was present.
Train Wrecked in Landslide.
 Quebec, April 15.—A work train on the Grand Trunk Pacific was caught in a landslide 50 miles above Lacombe this afternoon. The train and a number of men were buried. It is believed that many persons were killed or severely injured. Details of the accident are yet lacking.
