

BELIEVED SHE ATE POLLYWOGS

AND IS NOW IN A STATE OF NERVOUS COLLAPSE FROM SOCIETY INITIATION—WILL BE THREE YEARS BEFORE SHE RECOVERS.

Miss Dora LaGrange was born in Lake City, Minnesota, June 28, 1879, and died at the home of her parents in South Salem, April 17, 1910. She came to Oregon in 1889, and to Salem in 1890, and here she lived until her death.

Father and mother, two brothers, and her fiancée are left behind to grieve. A little brother, long since dead, is with her at rest.

Dora's life was quiet and uneventful, and yet her life, as well as her character, was out of the ordinary run. Always delicate, more than once through the years given up to die, and for many years forced to fight sickness, yet always brave, smiling, and hopeful, and absolutely pure and true, she lived beautifully and died as only the good die.

The five persons who loved best are rich in memories of this dear one, and a host of friends will long recall with pleasure her sweet, womanly, genuine presence.

Miss LaGrange was a graduate of the East Salem school, class of 1897.

Cody Plans for Death.
Chicago, April 27.—When "Buffalo Bill" Cody dies his body will be buried on the summit of Cedar Mountain, in Big Horn county, Wyoming, and over it will stand a marble buffalo, 40 feet high, with electric lights in the eye sockets so brilliant that they can be seen eight miles away.

At least that is what Cody himself plans, though he says he is far from a dead one now. The plans were revealed by Charles A. Heath in a lecture to the Geographical society of Chicago. Heath declares Buffalo Bill confided this plan to him a year ago.

STORM'S ANTICS PUZZLE CHICAGO WEATHER SHARPS
Chicago, April 27.—Chicago weather sharps are puzzling today over the queer antics of a storm that has been passing and repassing above the city for several days.

The storm first appeared last Friday, and, after a two-days' blow, was lost to the northwest of Lake Michigan.

A day later it met a storm from the Eastern states, and the combined gales came raging back over the city.

Passing toward the southwest the storm met with another from Kansas, and was again blown over Chicago.

Weather men look upon the aerial antics as phenomenal, and have been busy tracing the course of the gales.

The storm now is believed to be in central Michigan, where, it is hoped, that it will vanish.

Fell Off the Water Wagon.
New York, April 27.—"Bugs" Raymond, eccentric twirler for the New York Giants, quit today. He had a quarrel with Manager McGraw and announced that he would throw no more twisters for the Giants.

Moscow, April 27.—A 15-year-old lad named Fonim will have to answer for the theft of \$500,000 worth of jewels from the famous Uspenski cathedral, in the Kremlin. Fonim has surrendered to the police and returned the jewels. He had hidden in the cathedral, but was finally forced out by hunger. Owing to his youth and ignorance the authorities are disposed to deal with him leniently.

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PRESIDENT WORKS FOR PET BILLS

PRESIDENT TAFT ATTEMPTING TO GET ACTION ON POSTAL SAVINGS BANK BILL AND OTHER PET MEASURES—IS CONFIDENT.

Washington, April 27.—With the possibility of congress adjourning soon after June 1, President Taft is attempting to get action on the postal savings bank bill which appears to have struck a snag in the house committee.

The president is confident a railroad bill will pass and hopes the injunction bill will be enacted.

He is anxious to see the postal bank bill passed and will try to obtain action upon the statehood bill. The president has told friends that he considers the postal bank bill necessary to uphold the platform promises. He is reported to have intimated plainly that if the house regulars blocked its progress, votes could be gained for it among the insurgents and the democrats.

It is expected that as soon as the vote is taken on the railroad bill, house republicans will hold a caucus upon the postal bank bill and the statehood measure.

ITALIANS FIGHT OVER PRETTY GIRL
Butler, Pa., April 27.—Tony Pasquella and Michael Feran, Italian laborers, are in the hospital today suffering from a number of knife wounds received in a stiletto duel over Annetto Mariano, a pretty 19-year-old Italian girl.

Both men were her suitors. Yesterday she said: "I shall wed the better man."

The two Italians thereupon went to the outskirts of the city where they slashed at each other for half an hour. Then they went to Annetto to whom they bared their wounds.

Annetto said that she could make no choice, as neither had won. While the contestants were being taken to the hospital, they grasped hands and vowed to have nothing more to do with the girl.

Sham Battle for Roosevelt.

Paris, April 27.—As a prelude to the Kriegspiel, or war game, that Colonel Roosevelt expects to view at Berlin, the French government today provided a sham battle for the edification of the American visitor.

Two brigades of infantry, two regiments of artillery and two regiments of cavalry composed the forces in action. The battle ended when flying squadrons of cuirassiers triumphantly charged a battery.

At the conclusion of the charge Roosevelt rose to his feet and cheered the victors.

Governor Delstein directed the maneuvers.

Roosevelt this afternoon went to Versailles, and plans to attend a performance of "Chantier" tonight.

Kingly honors are being paid to the memory of Bjornson. The body will be sent to Havre, and there taken aboard a warship bound for Norway.

Work for Good Roads.
The Oregon State Automobile association and the Portland Automobile club are doing a great work for good roads. Mr. H. R. Glenn, in charge of the "Pathfinder" car" (owned jointly by the state association and the City club), is going to make a tour of all the principal roads in Eastern Oregon. These gentlemen will be in The Dalles on Tuesday and will map out their trip from there with the idea of compiling an accurate road map. Reliable road information in this state is very scarce, and with a good map available tourists' automobiles from all parts of the United States will be almost as plentiful on the country roads as in the towns and cities today.

This new map will show distance between towns, grades, every turn in the road, and odometer readings.

The Ancient Order of Hibernians who are to hold their annual convention in Portland July 19 to 24 of this year say no meeting ever excited such advance interest. Late advices say Philadelphia county, Pennsylvania, will send 25 delegates, while from the Middle West special cars and even special trains are being planned right now.
