KLAMATH COUNTY VOTERS FAVOR COURT HOUSE

A "straw vote" was taken Saturday in Klamath county on the question of moving the courthouse to the Hot Spring addition and resulted in a victory for the new site. Eleven hundred and three votes were cast in the county, 598 for moving and 505 for keeping it where it is, giving the winners a majority of 93.

In Klamath Falls 614 votes were cast, 520 for moving and 94 against. Papers have been filed, asking for a permanent injunction against the county court acting in accordance with the vote.
