This extension of credit and the seductions that are practiced to get the trade of people in the small communities is nothing but the warfare of the trusts that want to swallow the earth.

While we appreciate the compliment of offering us credit at their great department store, we cannot secept it and advise our readers to shun such practices.

People who are making their living off a community should consider it disloyal to not support the home merchant first, last and all the time and teach their children to do the same.

THE DISGRACE OF ILLINOIS.

All will remember how the Illinois legislature last winter was deadlocked for one hundred days over electing a Senator.

State Senator Holtslaw of Juka, Ills., now confeses that he got \$2500 nd \$700 for his vote for Lorimer for U. S. Senator.

It was deadlocked with money to defeat the popular choice. This confession he makes to a grand jury after he "broke down" and other Senators and Representatives are implicated.

To understand fully the importance of this confession, it must be remembered that Lorimer was elected over Hopkins, the popular choice

at the Direct Primary and general election. The Illinois Direct Primary law provides that the people may nominate and elect Senators by direct vote of the people.

But It has no pledge in it like the Oregon Direct Primary law that enables the people to hold their representatives in line.

The Illinois Direct Primary law provides that the people may nominate and may elect but the office can then be bought with money by some one else-as Lorimer bought it. The Oregon Direct Primary law has Statement No. One under the

operation of which the men who go to the legislature dare not sell their votes for money or offices to elect some other man Senator. The Oregon Machine wants an assembly to take away from the people

if possible the right to nominate andelect their officials.

. The old Oregon politician Machine is moving heaven and earth to emasculate the Oregon Direct Primary law and restore corruption. Statement No. One that is so much reviled by the Machine is lacking in Illinois, and-so money was used to overthrow the will of the people and Lorimer bought his seat in the United States Senate, just as the

rest of the tainted Senators bought their seats. Statement No. One enables the people to have their votes counted and not be cheated out of it as was done in Illinois when Hopkins defeated

the people's choice by the use of money., Statement No. One makes the man who goes to the legislature and says he believes in election of Senators by Direct vote of the people DELIV ER THE GOODS.

And why should not the alleged Representatives of the people respect the will of the people?

Has not the poorest man as much right to have his vote respected when he casts it for U. S. Senator, as the richest boss and the greatest corporation lawyer?

Illinois, the mother of the Republican party, the home of the greatest people's president the world has ever produced is disgraced and humiliated by the revelations in the Lorimer case.

Mr. Lorimer will ask the U. S. Senate to investigate, and members of that August body may yet have to seat Mr. Hopkins.
