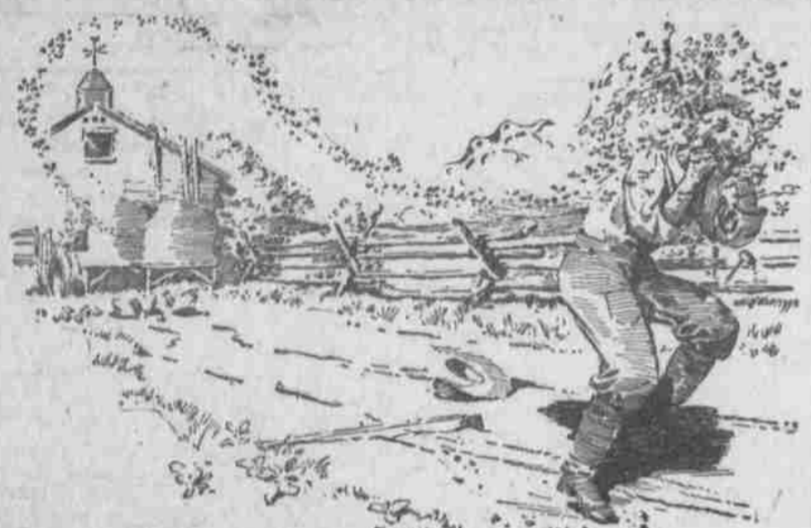

CHARLTON SUSPECTED OF MURDER

(UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.)
 Como, Italy, June 13.—The local police today received word that Porter Charlton was seen in Lucerne, Switzerland, last Saturday. The Swiss police say they traced Charlton to Lucerne, where he disappeared. Meanwhile Constantine Ispolatoff, a Russian, is being held on suspicion pending the investigation of the murder of Mrs. Mary Scott Castle Charlton. Other European cities report having seen Charlton. Opinion here is divided regarding the identity of the murderer. Many believe that Charlton's disappearance places him under suspicion and attribute his possible action to jealousy or indifference for his wife, to whom he had been married only three months. Others believe that Charlton was murdered by the same persons who struck down his wife and thrust her alive into the iron bound trunk to drown in the lake. The police attach significance to this theory and are again dragging the lake in an effort to find Charlton's body in case he has been murdered.

The authorities also began a more systematic search of Villa Legnazzi, which the Charltons occupied. The grounds around the villa are being dug up under the supervision of the chief of police. The chief of police and Consul Caughy of Milan believe Charlton was murdered; the remainder of the police, including special detectives, believe Charlton was the murderer.

The police of Milan and Rome, who are working on the case, were unable to break down Ispolatoff's story that he last saw the Charltons on the day before the murder. Ispolatoff was awakened suddenly to face an accusation that he bought a set of brass knuckles from Bassi, a druggist at Cernobbio. The Russian calmly denied that he ever had seen the knuckles before.

The lack of tangible evidence is driving the police, again to the theory that some connection exists between the murder of Mrs. Charlton and that of Miss Estella Reid in Naples. Nothing definite has been learned by them to cause such belief, so far as can be ascertained. The police, who believe Ispolatoff is the murderer, assigned robbery as a motive for the crime.

Ispolatoff, discussing his acquaintance with the Charltons, said: "I saw enough of the Charlton's married life to make it impossible for me to love Mrs. Charlton. Charlton told me things about his wife which might have preyed on his mind, leading him to kill her." The police refused to say what the alleged accusations of Charlton were.

Charlton's Coat Found.

Como, Italy June 13.—Fishermen this afternoon found a coat in Lake Como, believed to be owned by Porter Charlton, husband of Mary Scott Castle Charlton, whose body was found in the lake. This strengthens the theory that Charlton was also killed by the person who murdered his wife.
