Says He Was Over-charged-- W. R. Loughmiller, of Silvertown, today complained to the Oregon Railroad Commission that he had been over-charged by the Southern Pacific Railroad company in the shipment of some brick. The amount of brick shipped, he states, was 49,000 pounds and that upon which he was made to pay freight 50,000 pounds. Registration Is Slow-- While the registration books have been open for two weeks by the county clerk the registration has been remarkably slow--but 400 registering from the whole county. There is a marked increase this week, however, over the first, and it is believed that as the election approaches the registration will increase at a rapid rate.

SPEAKER IS ON THE WAR PATH

Washington, June 18.—Speaker Cannon replied fiercely from the floor of the house today to the speeches of the insurgents made during the debate on rules reform yesterday. "When my time comes I would rather pass from the house than bend my knee before demagogues and self constituted righteous members of this house who criticize the speaker," Cannon said. "Some of the members attacking the speaker wouldn't know the rules if they saw them coming down the street." Cannon denied that he had ever smothered legislation. The first action of the house under the rule adopted yesterday giving the house power to call up bills on which committees had failed to report was used to call up a bill cutting democratic congressional representation in southern states. Bennett (Rep., New York) introduced the resolution discharging the committee. The democrats yesterday voted for the reform resolution.

TROUBLE GROWS IN OLD MEXICO

El Paso, Texas, June 18.—Troops are marching overland today from Hermosillo to Cananea, where 75 armed Mexicans were arrested Thursday night. Rifles and a quantity of ammunition were seized. Five hundred troops are already in Cananea but it is believed more are needed to prevent an outbreak against the government. A special dispatch received here quotes a man opposed to President Diaz as saying: "General Torres had better keep his troops at Hermosillo, because he will need them there. Yucatan is not the only place where Diaz will need troops."

First Gold from Alaska. Seattle, Wash., June 18.—The first shipment of Alaskan gold, \$305,000 worth, to come south this year, is in the vaults of the National Bank of Commerce and the Washington Trust Co., and the first passengers from the interior of Alaska this year are at various hotels. Two steamships from Skagway arrived within 15 minutes of each other last night, marking the opening of the travel from Northern Alaska.

Strike Is About Ended. Portland, Ore., June 18.—Striking teamsters will not go back to work Monday. Definite vote to this effect was taken today. M. C. Banfield, president of the Employers' association, had announced that all old men whose places had not been taken by imported strikebreakers would be allowed to return to work if they applied for work Monday. He added that more than 150 strikebreakers were on their way to Portland, and would go to work permanently if the regular drivers didn't come back.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Seattle, Wash., June 18.—Reports that the Iditarod gold strike has fizzled out are scouted by J. H. Scott, the only arrival in Seattle this year direct from the diggings. "While I do not look for a second Nome or Klondike, I am convinced that there is some great paying gravel bodien there," said Scott today. "When I left the Iditarod, dirt paying \$5 per square foot had been found on Flat Creek. Pay dirt well worth working had been discovered on Otter, Willow, Slate, Black and Granite Creeks, all tributaries of the Iditarod. "I know conditions pretty well in that locality and I believe they are finding the yellow stuff in good quantities. But as I said before they are not going to make any very big clean ups until they get in some big machinery."
