"ANTI-MATRIMONY" WITH MISS CROSMAN IN THE LEADING ROLE COMBINES EXQUISITE COMEDY WITH FINE ART—COMING MONDAY EVENING.

It was not supposed that the people of this city would have an opportunity to see Henrietta Crosman in "Anti-Matrimony" for some time; but owing to a fortunate engagement on the Pacific Coast this Spring and Summer—the first time in three years—Miss Crosman is able to stop off here for one performance on Monday night, July 11th.

Miss Crosman has never been so happily suited in a play as she is in "Anti-Matrimony" the whimsical comedy by Percy MacKaye. It is an interesting fact that Mr. MacKaye has long had an ambition to write a play for Miss Crosman. He wrote that sublime tragedy, "Sappho and Phaon" for Mr. Fiske; he provided Sothern and Marlowe with "Joan of Arc" in which they appeared in England and America; he wrote "Mater," "The Canterbury Pilgrims" and other gems of dramatic literature, and those who had always associated him with the most serious and lofty in the drama were surprised when he announced a whimsical comedy for Miss Crosman. Yet "Anti-Matrimony" has proven that his sense of humor is as finely developed as his poetic imagination. For this play, as presented by Miss Crosman, is an exquisite comedy; at times bordering on rollicking farce, and occasionally even taking the form of satirical burlesque. Its fun is hearty and infectious, and its well-drawn characters are portrayed by one of those splendid companies Miss Crosman always has in her support. Miss Crosman herself is superb in the role of a resourceful, home-loving young New England wife, who sets about to convert a misguided pair of relatives to the religion of happiness and common sense.
