Medford, Or., July 12 .- Medford is to have a new daily newspaper to be called the Medford Sun. The Sun will be a morning paper and will issue its first number July 16. It will be republican in politics and its policy will be to take no part in the prohibition question or to mix in other factional fights.

Since the consolidation of the two papers here about a year ago the republicans have had no representation in the daily newspaper field. with the result that the local democrat paper, alleged to be independent, has made an effort to disrupt the republican party in Jackson county, by continual criticism of President Taft and republican leaders and measures generally.

Though Jackson county is overwhelmingly republican, the party is confronted with the fact that several of the best offices in the county are filled by democrats, most of whom were elected on the "non-partisan" dodge.


