PHOENIX IS GUTTED BY FIRE

MEDFORD AND ASHLAND FIRE DEPARTMENTS RESPOND TO CALL FOR AID FOR STRICKEN SISTER CITY.

Medford, Ore. July 13.—The little town of Phoenix, between this town and Medford, today suffered the worst fire in its history, when a planing mill and a score of nearby buildings burned. Aid was summoned from Medford and Ashland, and fire companies from these towns arrived in time to check the flames which threatened the destruction of the entire city.

TAFT MAY TAKE HAND IN MUDDLE

Beverly, Mass., July 13.—That President Taft will assume the person of leader of the Republican party in the New York campaign, following his return from a week's cruise along the coast, is the prediction here today. He was met at the station by his family only. Ballinger did not care to talk politics today. He did declare, however, that he would take no active part in the Washington state campaign now on.

BACK BROKEN IN SCUFFLE FOR HOT SANDWICH

Los Angeles, Calif., July 13.—Ralph Phillips, formerly a postal employee, lies today in the Sisters of Mercy hospital with a broken back, and Jesse Navarre is in jail, the results of a battle over a sandwich in a curbstone lunch wagon. Phillips entered the wagon and seized a "hot dog" sandwich which Navarre had ordered, according to Navarre's story to the police. During the scuffle that ensued Phillips fell across a curbstone. His spine was broken and he sustained severe bruises about his head. It is doubtful if he will recover.

TIMBER ON FIRE NEAR ASTORIA

Astoria, Ore., July 13.—A forest fire, which started in the clearing at the Hammond Lumber company's logging camp near Oak Point Sunday, has already caused damage estimated at \$20,000 and is still burning. No green timber has yet been burned. A large force of men is fighting the flames. Practically all of the company's camp has been destroyed, including the cook house, two bunk houses, blacksmith shop and two residence houses. Four treaties along the line of the company's logging railroad have been burned also. Fire Warden D. H. Prescott, of Wahkiakum county, is directing the fire fighters.

DAUGHTER KILLS ASSASSIN OF HER FATHER

New Orleans, La., July 13.—Joseph Spiggano, a Black Hand agent, today shot and killed John Manzella, a wealthy Sicilian merchant, who refused a demand for money, and was then himself shot and killed by Manzella's daughter as he attempted to escape. Spiggano entered Manzella's store at daylight. He demanded a sum of money, threatening vengeance by the Black Hand society. Manzella refused and tried to put Spiggano out of the store. The intruder drew a revolver and shot Manzella through the heart. Then he rushed out of the store. As he reached the sidewalk Manzella's daughter, who had heard the dispute, ran to the front of the store and shot Spiggano.

WHITE CATTLE RUSTLERS PREYING ON IDAHO HERDS

Boise, Ida., July 13.—That a murderous gang of cattle rustlers are operating in Southern Idaho and Northern Nevada seems well established today following the unearthing of evidence by Commissioner Day of the state land office, that hundreds of cattle have been stolen recently, and a band of Indian "rustlers" has disappeared. It is believed that white outlaws met and killed the Indians because the red men were interfering with the whites' plans.
