At the conclusion of the statement it was incidentally declared that the association "does not want to put the unions out of existence, or show hostility toward them."

MORE ROOM NEEDED IN THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Pursuant to an adjournment taken at a previous meeting the school board held a session last evening, and in addition to transacting a volume of routine business also disposed of a number of matters of general interest.

One of the subjects considered was the present condition of the high school. This building is overcrowded and unless additions are made it will be necessary to install the ninth grade in the East school. After discussing the subject at length a committee consisting of Trustees Millard Holt and Lafky was appointed to take the matter up, and see what can be done in the way of a relief.

The clerk of the board will hereafter collect all dues for tuition and also all laboratory fees. Heretofore this duty has fallen upon the principal of the high school.
