CORVALLIS AND ALSEA GETS BUSY

IN ANTICIPATION OF ACTION OF ATTORNEY-GENERAL, UNDER INSTRUCTIONS OF RAILROAD COMMISSION, COMPEL CESSATION OF BUSINESS, BEGINS ACTIVE CAMPAIGN OF IMPROVEMENTS.

Railroad Commissioner Campbell, Engineer Earl, and Attorney General Crawford returned last evening from Corvallis where they went for the purpose of making an inspection of the Corvallis & Alsea River Railroad company which company's track was attacked by the commission some time ago, and the attorney general directed to bring proceedings against the railroad company which would have for their object the cessation of all business until the track was put into condition. The visit and inspection was made yesterday to give the attorney general the necessary data to institute his action, but owing to the fact that the company has anticipated any compulsory proceedings, and is busily engaged in making the repairs it may be that no proceedings will be instituted. The officers found the company engaged in the construction of bridges and if it continues with the work as rapidly as it is now doing they will all be completed and in first class shape in the course of two or three weeks. The company is also repairing the track where ever it is necessary and this work the officers were assured would be rushed with all possible dispatch and made in such a manner that it would comply in every respect with the law on the subject.

WOMAN'S BODY FOUND IN PARK—MAY BE MURDER

[UNITED PRESS LEADERS WIRE.] Philadelphia, Pa., July 30.—Under circumstances that indicate murder, the body of Catherine Cloughessy, 35, governess, was found on a lawn opposite the Germantown cricket club at Mannheim today. The police theory that the woman swallowed her false teeth and strangled to death is generally ridiculed. The woman's clothing was disarranged as though she had fought for her life with an assailant. There were three livid marks on the throat which might have been caused by the pressure of fingers.

King's Power Overrated.

Paris, July 30.—In view of the strained relations between Spain and the vatican as indicated in despatches from Rome and Madrid, the general feeling here, while inclined to be anti-clerical, is that the power of the young king has been overrated in the Madrid messages.

Nearly every despatch coming from a Spanish city is strictly censored; the fulsome praise accorded governmental personages is almost as sickening as it is ridiculous. Even after carefully pruning of the overrating of the official Spanish prowess, enough of the despatches remains to show that they are intended as curtains to hide from the world the real state of affairs in the castilian realm.

King Alfonso indeed has become a world figure, but in the general European power he is a sorry one. Undoubtedly his every move is ruled by his advisors, and these are noted on the continent more for rapacity than for their patriotism.

France, although anti-clerical and republican, is doing everything in her power to preserve neutrality along the Franco-Spanish frontier. Strong detachments of troops are posted in the principal garrisons and every precaution is being taken to keep faith with disturbed Spain.

wired to the Canadian government, and Dew was warned that London methods were not Canadian methods, and that the Canadians desired a little publicity, the lack of which resulted in the escape of Dr. Crippen in England.

Dew adopted an almost impenetrable disguise when he boarded the White Star Liner Laurentic to chase "Crippen." He registered as "Dewhurst," and the passengers were nearly an hour in ascertaining who the ruddy faced, mysterious gentleman was who trod so softly on the decks.

The arrest of Dr. Crippen has become a personal matter with the inspector, as Dew accepted Crippen's promise that he would not try to escape. Dr Crippen, however, vanished as soon as inspector Dew had returned to Scotland Yard.

Under pressure Inspector Dew later ruled that reporters might go aboard the tug Eureka providing they remain below decks until after the arrest is made.

Dew and Chief McCarthy, of Montreal, Chief Denis of Lewis and Constable Gavreau, of Father Point, will board the steamer Montrose from a pilot vessel. Captain Kendall will point out the suspected couple, Inspector Dew will identify them if possible, and Chief McCarthy will make the arrests.

At noon the Montrose was off Heath Point, Anticosti Island. The vessel cannot arrive at Montreal before noon tomorrow.

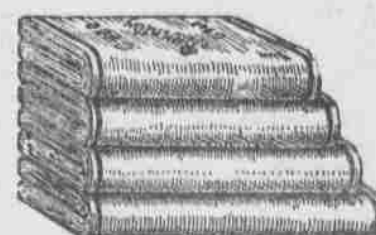
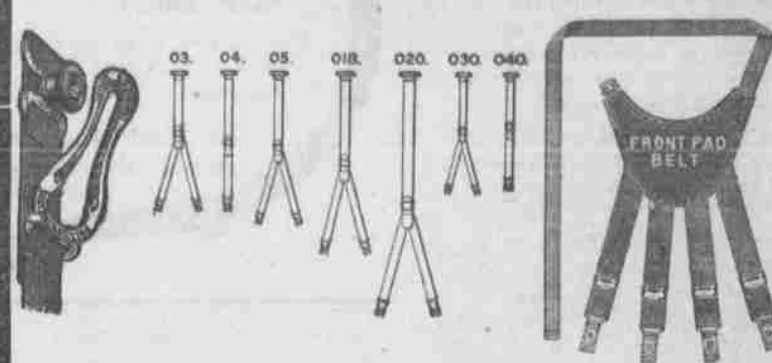

TEAMSTERS PROPOSE TO ARBITRATE

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF STRIKERS MAKES OVERTURES OF PEACE TO EMPLOYERS WHICH, IF ACCEPTED, WILL TERMINATE LONG STRIKE IN PORTLAND.

Portland, Ore., July 30.—Arbitration of the teamsters' strike is again offered to the employers today, following a meeting of the central executive committee, representing the combined union organizations of Portland, and a second meeting of the Central Labor Council last night.

For over a month Portland's business men have been put to much inconvenience, freight has piled up in warehouses, and several men have been severely injured in clashes on account of the refusal of the operating draymen to pay a daily wage increase of 25 cents to their teamsters.

Through it all the unions have stood aloof from violence, and have been anxious to deal with the employers, but their efforts toward reconciliation were unsuccessful.

It is believed that the much-talked-of general strike of all unions in Portland, numbering 11,000 men, will result should the drawmen's association decide not to accept the offer to arbitrate. While such action is not hinted at in the resolution asking for a peace, union leaders declare that such a step is under consideration.

A reasonable period of time will be given the employers to formulate a reply before further action is taken by the unions.

Enjoin Show of Fight Films. Chicago, July 30.—A mandamus suit was filed today against Mayor Fred Busso and the city of Chicago to compel the city authorities to allow pictures of the Jeffries-Johnson fight at Reno to be displayed.

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against countenancing any act that might be construed as giving aid to the revolutionists.

The Leader today prints a despatch from Rome which says that the vatican has warned Spain against becoming involved in a civil war. It declares that the pope can rely on the support of a majority of the Spanish people in the crisis of affairs between church and state.

This is regarded here as a covert threat and it is believed that it intimates that His Holiness will throw the vatican's support to the revolutionists. This undoubtedly would end in the overthrow of Alfonso, and the enthronement of Don Jaime or the establishment of a republic, diplomatists here believe.

Alfonso "Stands Pat" On Religion.

Madrid, July 30.—The abrupt severance of friendly relations of Spain with the vatican brings King Alfonso into the foreground of European politics today. Opponents of the young monarch have doubted the sincerity of the king's anti-religious actions from the time the church and state locked horns in Spain. Today they praise the king's stand and give him credit, rather than Premier Canalejas, who still is held in popular suspicion.

Marquis Emilio De Ojeda, Spanish ambassador to the vatican, probably will return his credentials to His Holiness and start for Madrid today. This would mark complete severance of relations, which now virtually are broken off through the official announcement made by the king's prime minister.

The action of the cabinet is expected to throw the kingdom into turmoil. While a great number of the industrial population favor the supremacy of state over the church there are thousands of Spaniards who believe the church should have equal rights with the civil government. Should a further split occur it is probable that these will throw in their lot with Don Jaime, the Carlist pretender to the throne, who al-
