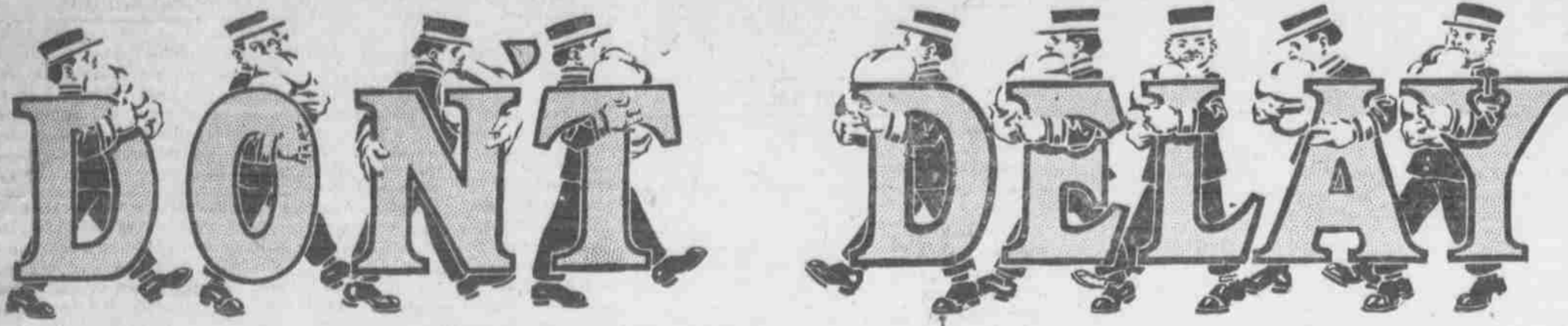

FIRES ARE SWEEPING THE FOREST

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 8.—The worst forest fire in the history of that part of the country is raging near Bell Grove, according to reports brought here by Ned Calkins. Calkins estimates that each quarter section burned contained from 2,000,000 to 4,000,000 feet of choice timber. It is reported that a rancher named Dow was cremated in a fire at Mira Bay, where the flames leaped a gap of half a mile, catching brush at Gould's landing. Several families lost everything in the fire. No high winds have blown in the Coeur d'Alene forest, in Idaho, and reports from the first stricken districts indicate that the situation is encouraging. Trenches have been dug and practically encompassed the burning areas. Reports from Hope, Idaho, state that the town is almost surrounded by fire. A heavy rain fell last night, which probably will reduce the fire to such proportions that they can be controlled by the hundreds of fighters.
