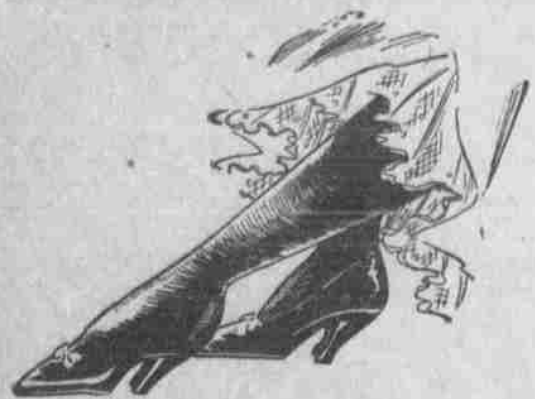

MAY CAUSE
FINANCIAL
TROUBLES

BURNING OF BELGIUM EXPOSITION CAUSES LABORERS TO BE DISCHARGED — VISITORS ARE FLOCKING FROM CITY AND HOTELS ARE BECOMING DESERTED.

Brussels, Aug. 16.—Following the heavy losses sustained by those interested in the burned world's exposition, the people of Belgium are demanding that an extra session of the parliament be called to prevent a possible financial panic. Thousands of employes of the fair have been dismissed and as a consequence labor conditions are critical. Starvation, it is said, threatens many of the poorer classes.

The advocates of an extra parliamentary session will ask that a bonus be voted to the promoters of the exposition, whose financial injuries are tremendous.

The fair re-opened today, the remaining small cluster of buildings being visited by a mere handful of people. The hotels of the city are deserted and the proprietors are losing money.

H. S. Pelsal the South Salem grower also brought in a plate of magnificent Gravenstein apples from his home place on Salem heights. They are perfect fruit as to shape and color, and free from all blemish or vermin. Again this is proof that the Willamette Valley can produce as fine apples as any section in the world.

Remains Shipped to Athens—
The remains of W. W. Brace, who died at the hospital for insane on August 13, from apoplexy, were shipped to Athens today. He was 60 years of age.

Chandler Wants Cars—
E. M. Chandler, of Middleton, today filed a complaint with the Oregon Railroad commission against the Southern Pacific Railway company because of its failure to provide him with cars. Chandler is a saw mill man and says that while other mills are enabled to secure cars from the railroad company, he is not, and he wants the commission to take action with regard to the matter.

McArthur to Salt Lake—
C. N. McArthur, private secretary to the governor, departed today for Salt Lake, where he will represent Acting Governor Bowerman at the Conference of the Western Governors which will be held there August 18. The conference is being held at the suggestion of Governor Hay, of Washington, and its purpose is to outline some uniform policy of conservation for the western states.

Hitchcock Investigates.

Washington, Aug. 16.—Postmaster-General Frank H. Hitchcock starts tonight on a Western scouting tour to ascertain the political conditions and report to President Taft on September 10 at Beverly. Hitchcock will go to the Pacific coast, also visiting New Mexico and Arizona.

May Have Bought Steamships.
