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MARION COUNTY CANDIDATE CONCLUDES STATE CAMPAIGN

Meets and Defies His Accusers in the Open at Five Public Meetings—McMahan Springs a New Lie.

Col. E. Hofer held five street meetings from his automobile last night at Fair Grounds, at the State street Electric grocery at the Yew Park store, at the Shaw & Poisal grocery in South Salem, and pulled up to the Adolph cigar store promptly at 9 o'clock, where a large crowd of friends were assembled Met All Accusations.

His meetings at all the places mentioned were well attended and he was greeted with applause on arriving and on leaving, and the plain, common citizens showed their respect and appreciation of a clean campaign. At each place he stated he was ready to answer any question and to meet any accuser. On State street he especially called out Tom Cornelius, present street commissioner and city marshal, who allowed the charge to be made that Col. Hofer had tried to bribe him with a sum of \$60 per month to let gambling games run in this city. But Mr. Cornelius was not there or if he was he would not show himself and didn't show himself at any of the meetings, and the challenge was repeated at each place.

A BIG MEETING.

At the Adolph Cigar Store Mr. Hofer repeated his challenge to all his accusers who have spread broadcast attacks on his character and there were cries for McMahan who was in the audience and Mr. Hofer waited for him to come forward, but he kept in the dark until Mr. Hofer said goodbye to the crowd when he got up in an automobile around the corner, provided for him, and entertained the crowd with a rehash of his inventions.

Many of the crowd remained to hear McMahan out of curiosity and because human nature likes a scrap of any kind, but he made no impression. He sprung one new lie and that is a remarkable record for McMahan to make when he is turned loose in one evening. His statements fell flat and he produced the effect of being a hired advocate to bemean a man who is not wanted by the man who hires McMahan to do about all he does, as McMahan notoriously does not interest himself in public matters unless there is something in it.

SECOND CHAMBERLAIN LIE.

McMahan made the statement that when Governor Chamberlain was up for his second election Colonel Hofer demanded \$520 of him for the support of The Capital Journal, and Chamberlain "told Hofer to go to Hell." What are the facts? Col. Hofer went to Governor Chamberlain when Dr. Withycombe was nominated as the Republican candidate and told him he was going to support Dr. Withycombe but that The Capital Journal would allow no one to throw mud at the Chamberlain administration and that Governor Chamberlain as a candidate would not have to spend any money to keep attacks out of The Salem Journal nor to get protection, but that he would be treated well and fairly without money and without price, because he had made the state a good governor. This was strictly carried out and after the campaign was over Governor Chamberlain thanked Hofer Brothers, and said he had never been treated as well by two men in his life, and had not been treated as well by any newspaper as by The Capital Journal. That is the truth, and Mr. McMahan is a liar in his statement.

VOTE WILL PROBABLY BE LIGHT

REGISTRATION DESPITE THE INTENSE INTEREST TAKEN IN THE CAMPAIGN AND THE GREAT PRINCIPLE OF THE PEOPLE'S RULING AT STAKE, IS SMALL.

The big campaign is over and before another 24 hours shall have rolled around, each and every one of the multitude of candidates for the several offices, to be handed out at the suffrage of the voters of the state of Oregon, will have known his fate.

The campaign in Marion county and the city of Salem came to a close last evening, when political fever and fervor was at its height, with a number of public speeches of large and enthusiastic audiences in several parts of the city by Col. E. Hofer, who spoke from the tonneau of his Ford automobile, which has covered over 4,000 miles throughout every section of the state during the campaign, and was roundly cheered by the immense crowds which greeted him at every meeting place.

Because of the light registration in this and every county of the state, notwithstanding the state-wide and nation-wide importance of the political issues which are up for final decision at the hands of the voters today, it is expected that the vote cast at the primary election today will be necessarily light and the contest, in many instances as between candidates and party issues, will be close and interesting.

The polls opened for the receipt of votes throughout the state, at noon today, and will remain open until 7 o'clock this evening. The indications, at the hour of going to press this afternoon, are that the vote will be light, as compared to previous primary elections, when issues of lesser importance were up for consideration, but the heavier vote, as usual, is expected to materialize between the hours of 5 and 7 o'clock this evening when the labor vote will be polled.
