

# SCHOOLS WILL OPEN ON MONDAY

**SUPERINTENDENT POWERS ANNOUNCES THE BOUNDARIES—NEW SCHOOL IN ENGLEWOOD WILL CAUSE SOME CHANGES, PARENTS PLEASE TAKE NOTICE.**

The following boundary lines of the Salem school districts are tentative. The permanent boundaries will be determined after the first week of school, and these will be announced in due time.

### Englewood School.

Beginning at a point where the Southern Pacific track intersects the Garden Road, thence east to Fourteenth street, thence south on said street to B street, thence east on said street to Nineteenth street, thence south on said street to Asylum avenue, thence east on said avenue to the east boundary of the district, thence north and west on said line to its intersection with the Southern Pacific track, thence south on said track to the place of beginning.

### Grant School.

Beginning at a point where the Southern Pacific track intersects the Garden Road, thence east to Fourteenth street, thence south on said street to D street, thence west on said street to Capitol street, thence south on said street to North Mill Creek, thence down said creek to the Willamette river, thence down said river to the northwest corner of the district, thence along the north line of the district to the Southern Pacific track, thence south on said track to the place of beginning.

### Garfield School.

Beginning at a point where Capitol street crosses North Mill creek, thence south through the state house grounds and the University grounds to Trade street, thence west to Winter street, thence south on said street to the most northerly branch of South Mill creek, thence down said branch to its junction with South Mill creek at the Church street bridge, thence down South

Mill creek to the Willamette river, thence down said river to the mouth of North Mill creek, thence up said creek to the place of beginning.

### East School.

Beginning at a point where Capitol street crosses North Mill creek, thence north to D street, thence east on said street to Fourteenth street, thence south on said street to B street, thence east on said street to Nineteenth street, thence on said street to Asylum avenue, thence east to the east line of the district, thence south on said line to Mill Creek, thence down said creek to the penitentiary switch, thence west on said switch to Turner street, thence north on said street to Mill street, thence west on said street to Nineteenth street, thence north on said street to Trade street, thence west on said street to Capitol street, thence north on said street through the University and state house grounds to the place of beginning.

### Park School.

Beginning at the Church street bridge on South Mill creek, thence up the most southerly branch of said creek through the Blind school grounds and the lands of A. Bush to Berry street, thence south on said street to the northeast corner of Pleasant Home addition, thence west along the north line of said addition to Fifth street, thence south on said street through Tuxedo Park addition and Nob Hill Annex to the south line of the district, thence easterly and northerly along said line to Mill creek, thence down said creek to the penitentiary switch, thence west on said switch to Turner street, thence north on said street to Mill street, thence west on said street to Nine tenth street, thence north on said street to Trade street, thence west on said street to Winter street, thence south on said street to the most northerly branch of South Mill creek, thence down said branch to the place of beginning.

### Lincoln School.

Beginning at the Church street bridge on South Mill creek, thence up the most southerly branch of said creek through the Blind school grounds and the lands of A. Bush to Berry street, thence south on Berry street to the northeast corner of Pleasant Home addition, thence westerly along the north line of said addition to Fifth street, thence south on said street through Tuxedo Park and Nob Hill addition to the south line of the district, thence westerly

Patrons are particularly requested to observe the following: All pupils are at first to report at the school they attended last year for registration and classification. They will then receive their census forms and book lists. This will occur Monday morning. The pupils will then be dismissed in order that they may purchase their books, and have their census forms properly filled in. Parents will make the proper entries on the census form, being careful to write in the correct street and number. The pupils will then return on Tuesday morning to the school they are to attend this year, according to boundary lines above shown. Please read the boundary line carefully in order to avoid as much confusion as possible. The center of the street will in all cases determine the school to be attended. As indicated at the head of this notice, the boundaries here published may be changed within the first two weeks of school in order to make the best possible distribution of the pupils.

All students who expect to attend the high school must appear at the high school Monday morning for registration and classification. This includes all ninth grade pupils. After the registration has been concluded all necessary instructions will be given. The entering ninth grade students will continue to report at the high school building until directed otherwise by the principal.

## SIX KILLED IN WRECK IN INDIANA

**ELECTRIC CARS HAVE HEAD-ON COLLISION ON THE INDIANA UNION TRACTION LINE NEAR TIPTON—ORDERS WERE NOT UNDERSTOOD.**

Tipton, Ind., Sept. 24.—Six persons were killed today in a head-on collision between two electric cars of the Indiana Union traction line near Tipton. The dead:

Dr. Hostchauser was enroute to Tipton, where he was to marry Nellie Coxen.

The wreck occurred at Jackson, a small station near here. A passenger car and an express car collided. It is believed that a misunderstanding of orders was responsible for the accident.

### STACEY ROBINSON CROSSES THE DIVIDE

Stacey Robinson, well-known and popular young man of this city, died at the Salem hospital, at 5 o'clock last evening, of a complication of organic disorders following an operation for the removal of hemorrhoids. Funeral services will be conducted at Rigdon's undertaking parlors, on High street, between Chemeketa and Court streets, at 2 o'clock tomorrow, Sunday afternoon, and Rev. Mr. Bandy, officiating, and interment will be had in City View cemetery.

### Decensed, a young man of about 25 years of age, was raised in this community and bore a reputation for honesty and morality of character that was unchallenged. Up to a few days ago he was in the best of health but was seized of an attack of piles and underwent a surgical day of this week. Early Friday

morning, when his physician called upon him he appeared to be in excellent health and spirits, but he took a sudden turn for the worse, a few minutes after the doctor had left his bedside, resulting from the effects of the anesthetic upon the kidneys, he lapsed into a comatose state and, in spite of heroic medical treatment, died within a few hours.

His parents reside at New West Minister, British Columbia, who beside a married sister who lives at Hoquiam, Washington, and a young wife, are the only relatives, have been advised of his death and they are expected to arrive on an early train tomorrow morning to be in attendance at the funeral.

### SIXTEEN BODIES ARE TAKEN FROM WRECK

Denver, Colo., Sept. 24.—Sixteen bodies have been recovered from the wreck of the Rock Island passenger near Clayton. Ten have been identified. Four bodies are believed to be those of tramps who were stealing a ride. Another is that of a young girl. One of the bodies was decapitated. No one has been blamed for the wreck by the officials, who have investigated. It was impossible to see the washout owing to a curve, it is said.

When Engineer Pickenburg saw the danger it was too late to stop the train. An examination of the wrecked engine shows he reversed and set his air brakes.

Members of the Topeka baseball club, who were on the train, arrived here today. None were injured. Third Baseman Stoffer assisted the physicians all night. Stoffer, Second Baseman Welch and Catcher Ensley dug out ten of the bodies recovered. They rescued 15 injured from the wreckage.
