CHOLERA EPIDEMIC IN NAPLES

MORE THAN 100 NEW CASES AND 75 DEATHS SINCE MONDAY--100,000 OF THE WEALTHIER CLASS HAVE FLED FROM THE CITY.

ROME, Sept. 28.—It is reported that 100,000 of the wealthier classes have fled from Naples as the result of the cholera epidemic there. With the removal of the censorship starting details of the conditions of affairs there are being received, and the fear of the cholera is growing more acute each day. Thousands from the cholera stricken area are fleeing into Rome. An edict was issued today ordering these examined, and if cholera symptoms are discovered Rome will be quarantined against Naples.

WILL TRY TO FLY FROM CHICAGO TO SPRINGFIELD

Chicago, Sept. 28.—Aviator Walter Brooks, a pupil of the Wrights, will attempt tomorrow to fly from Chicago to Springfield, a distance of 170 miles in a straight line for a prize of \$10,000 offered by the Chicago Record-Herald. Brooks will follow the line of the Illinois Central tracks and a special train bearing gasoline, lubricants and parts to be used in repairs will accompany him. Brooks in his biplane will carry 180 pounds of gasoline and two gallons of oil. He will try to make the trip without once coming to the ground.

Arrested for Forgery—Claude Schriener, a native of California, and a stranger in this city, who has been employed at the Red Front livery stable, on Chemeketa street, was arrested upon a warrant sworn out by Proprietor Kellogg, of the stables, upon the charge of forgery; was arraigned before Justice Webster this morning, and bound over to the grand jury.
