SPAIN SEETHING WITH REBELLION MAY START A REVOLUTION ANY DAY

IF ALFONSO AIDS MANUEL IT WILL PRECIPITATE WAR PREDICTED HE WILL DO THIS

King of Spain Has Ordered the Flower of His Army to Portugal's Frontiers and It Is Said Will Assist Portugal's Deposed King With a Strong Hand, in Order to Protect His Own Tottering Throne---Spanish Revolutionists Openly Celebrate the Victory of Their Portuguese Brethren---Everything Points to the Speedy Placing of Spain in the Ranks of the World's Republics.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Madrid, (Via Hendaye, France), Oct. 6.—The flower of the Spanish army has been ordered to the Portuguese frontier.

Madrid is seething with excitement over the news from Portugal, and the Republicans assert that it foreshadows an attempt on the part of King Alfonso's ministry to aid Dom Manuel against the Republicans of Portugal.

Republicans here predict that if this is attempted, civil war in Spain will be precipitated.

On the other hand Alfonso fears that the success of the Republican armies in Portugal will mean the overthrow of his power, and it is asserted that he has been counselled by his ministers to fight to the last ditch.

That Alfonso will pursue this

course is not doubted and it is therefore judged that he will assist Manuel with a strong Spanish force in order to frighten the Spanish Republicans into inactivity.

The Republicans are overjoyed at the success of their Portuguese brethren. A radical club where the Marseillaise was sung was raided last night by the police and a small riot followed. Afterward the radicals gathered in the streets, parading and cheering for the Portuguese revolutionists.

Great Uprising Feared.
Madrid, via Hendaye, Oct. 6.—Formidable military preparations have been made throughout Spain for a great uprising of the Republican revolutionists, supported by the clerical faction that is bitterly op-

Spain on Verge of Revolt.
Barcelona, Oct. 6.—Constant clashes between police and Republicans are occurring today. The situation is rapidly getting beyond control, and as a last resort Madrid has been asked to send reinforcements. Similar conditions prevail in other cities. The Republicans have hoisted their flags everywhere, and the police are busily engaged in tearing them down. Enthusiasm over the success of the Portuguese revolution is very great.

posed to the king and his cabinet. Plans for a great demonstration by the anti-royalists have been discovered by the government spies, and should they be carried out there is bound to be the utmost difficulty in handling the trouble makers.

There is no concealment of the fact that the demonstrations are to be of an anti-dynastic character, and to make matters worse, counter demonstrations are planned by the anti-clericals, and a clash of the factions would provide the opportunity for the precipitation of a revolution.

Republicans Are Restive.
Word comes from Barcelona that the Republicans have become extremely restive and there is a growing suspicion among the clericals there that King Alfonso plans to in-

PORTUGAL PROCLAIMS A REPUBLIC THE KING AND ROYAL FAMILY FLEE

BOTH THE FLEET AND FORTS OPEN FIRE ON THE PALACE--- ROYALTY HUNTS THE CELLAR

Slumbering Fires of Revolution Break Out When a Mob Ducks a Priest and Is Attacked by Police---Soldiers in Turn Open Fire on the Police---The Sailors on the Fleet, Hearing the Firing, Thought Revolution Had Broken Out, Run up the Republican Flag and Open Fire on the Palace---Forts Follow Suit, and King and Royal Family, Seeing All Is Over, Escape in Disguise.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Lisbon, Oct. 6.—Provisional President Braga today telegraphed the foreign offices throughout the world formally announcing the proclamation of the republic of Portugal.

"The provisional government guarantees public order and safety," the message said. Additional dispatches state that the administration of President Theophile Braga, who has assumed the direction of the provisional government, is meeting with genuine approval, and that a favorable impression is spreading among the opponents of the republic. The chief aim of Braga and his ministers seems to be to placate the royalists and prevent a civil war.

The Motorman Forgot.
Staunton, Ill., Oct. 6.—"I forgot; I forgot."

This is the only explanation Motorman John Lierman has to offer for the wreck that killed 36 and injured as many more near here Tuesday evening. Lierman has been arrested and will likely be held responsible for the deaths by the coroner, who will hold an inquest into the deaths caused by the accident. The hearing was begun today, but was continued for two weeks. All the bodies of the victims have been identified.

advertisers that relationship, glorified, as it was, by love, which even court conventionally could not throttle.

"I do not make any capital of my relation with Manuel. I kept quiet and reserved. Recently a variety theater in Paris offered me a huge salary to appear billed as Manuel's mistress, but I refused. The same theater produced a sketch in which I and the king were the chief figures, but there was nothing blameable in that.

"I never asked the papers to call me the 'uncrowned queen of Portugal.' I first met the king 15 months ago at Paris, where he was dining. He had been introduced to me after a performance, and it was love at first sight. I became his mistress.

"The love I bore him and the love he bore me justified all in our eyes. After our meeting we met frequently. He came repeatedly to Paris to visit me. We were happy together in those days.

"In February of this year Manuel summoned me to Lisbon and I danced at a charity fair organized for the relief of the victims of the Oporto fire. I did not live in a suite in the royal

The success of the Republicans has won the support of the Lisbon populace, although the troops in the provinces are reported as being loyal to Manuel. The provincial regiments, however, are handicapped because the revolutionists control the telegraph lines out of Lisbon and succeeded in cutting wires in various parts of the kingdom, thus curtailing the movements of their enemies.

Badajos, Spain, (Portuguese Frontier), Oct. 6.—Two hundred killed and 400 wounded are the estimated casualties at Lisbon, according to refugees arriving today. They claim these figures are conservative, and that later advices will swell the totals.

A Combination of Circumstances.
A combination of circumstances, rather than any detailed plans precipitated the coup d'etat of last Tuesday. The plans for revolutionary action had been laid long ago but the time was not deemed ripe.

Dom Manuel's intrigue with Mlle. Caby Des Lis, however, started the revolution. Then followed the assassination of Deputy Bombarda. Finally, last Saturday, the revolutionists learned that the Portuguese fleet, assembled in Lisbon harbor, was to be scattered to distant stations owing to the Republican sentiment among the officers and men.

The revolutionists decided to act quickly. Following the death of Bombarda, who was killed by an officer, at the instigation, it is judged, of the clericals, a mob threw a priest into the Tagus river.

Police and Soldiers Clash.
The police charged the mob and a regiment of infantry which happened to be passing, charged upon the police. Both sides shot to kill. The fleet in the harbor, thinking that the revolution had begun, became alive with mutiny. Royalist commanders were overpowered in their quarters or at stations aboard the vessels. Republican flags were run up and the guns of the warships trained on the citadel.

Sailors were sent ashore by the boatload to join with the mutinous troops in attacking the police.

The police, soon outnumbered, broke and ran, the mob pursuing them, shooting and cutting down the laggards. The sounds of conflict

Allowed King to Escape.
King Manuel escaped. This was in accordance with the revolutionary program, according to a statement given the United Press on the highest authority.

The Republicans decided that it was preferable to exile Manuel rather than kill him. The leaders know where the deposed king is and have purposely spread conflicting reports in order to prevent his capture, and place them in the embarrassing position of deciding Manuel's fate.

The provincial government is firmly repressing disorders. The only fear expressed is that England may intervene in behalf of the royalists. It will be formally announced tomorrow that the existing treaties will be observed by the new regime, and in this way it is hoped that intervention may be averted.
