ALFONSO'S THRONE TOTTERING.

great industrial strike on the railroads of France and the unrest in Spain today threaten to precipitate the fall of the already tottering throne of Alfonso XIII.

Preparations are being made secretly for the removal of members of the royal family to a point near the French frontier, presumably San Sebastian, the summer capital. Officials of the government deny any preparations for untoward events, but it is known here, and admitted officially, that the English fleet at Gibraltar is prepared to aid in protecting the royal family. Should revolution overthrow the dynasty it is believed the Spanish princess will be placed on board a warship to rejoin the king and queen in England. Preparations for taking the royal family into France are believed to be a blind to cloak the real destination of royalty in case of insurrection. It is thought that they would not be safe in France at the present time, and that England offers the best refuge.

Alarming reports continue to come in from the provinces through secret

channels of the revolutionists. Official messages convey little information of conditions; the only intimation being the constant order for the transfer of troops. The official dispatches, however, invariably assign the movement of the army to the operations in Morocco, each order being accompanied by the stereotyped phrase, "For service in Africa."

While many garrisons in the south have actually been depleted of forces for the Riff campaign, it is known generally that reserves are constantly filling their places, and that the northern garrisons, where sedition is strongest, have not been disturbed.

into a revolutionary struggle for the purpose of overthrowing the government.

Bloodshed and rioting are imminent.

Scenes equalling the French revolutionary are expected when the French troops, half loyal to the republic and half favorable to the "syndicate," are ordered to suppress anti-foreign demonstrations.

"IT" SHOWED "ITS" TEETH TO CARMAN

"IT" SPOKE TO 2,000 IN DANVILLE AND SHOWED "ITS" ANNOYANCE WHEN MOTORMAN INTERRUPTED "ITS" SPEECH.

Danville, Ill., Oct. 13.—While speaking to a crowd of more than 2,000 persons here today Colonel Roosevelt took occasion to vent his spleen against a street car motorman who interrupted the proceedings when he allowed his car to pass through the middle of the crowd. Roosevelt stopped short in his speech. Directing a finger at the motorman and with a savage show of teeth, the colonel said:

"Some persons haven't any sense, even in Danville."

The motorman, whether he heard the colonel's remark or not, quickly put on the power and was out of sight in short order.

Colonel Roosevelt's speech was one round of denunciation for corrupt politicians and breakers of the public faith. Referring to the bribery scandals in connection with the election of William Lorimer to the United States senate, Roosevelt said:

"I do not know whether Danville legislators were among the jackpots in this case. If they were, drive them out of office. It makes no difference whether Republicans or Democrats are concerned, who or what the senator is—the man must be elected to office honestly."

Senator Beveridge, of Indiana, joined the Roosevelt party at Danville and was greeted cordially. Colonel Roosevelt speaks today in several Indiana towns and cities on behalf of Beveridge who is a candidate for re-election. In his itinerary today are included Crawfordsville, Covington, Linden, Lafayette, Colfax, Lebanon, Indianapolis, Anderson, Muncie and Richmond.

BIG DITCHING MACHINE IS CERTAINLY A WONDER

That big ditching machine brought here today the ditches for the North Salem sewer system, began operation yesterday, and drew a large crowd. The digging part of the machine is a large wheel upon the rim of which are alternate cutters and shovels of the steam shovel pattern, only smaller. The wheel is about 16 feet in diameter and cuts a ditch 18 or 20 inches wide. It hadn't got its appetite for dirt in good order yesterday, but still it managed to get away with a ditch some 13 feet deep and 300 feet long just as a sort of appetizer. When it gets down to real business, it will cut a ditch 13 feet deep at the rate of 18 inches a minute. It is well worth going up to see, for it can throw dirt faster even than a newspaper bent on burying a candidate. It is working on Center street between 13th and 14th today.

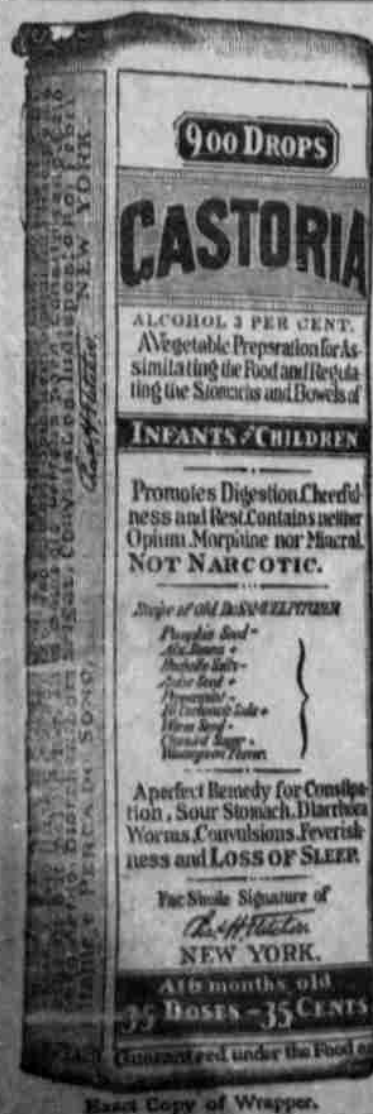
