New York, Oct. 18.—The following bits of criticism were culled today by the United Press from the extended comments of leading men and baseball writers.

FARMERS WANT LOWER RATES FOR WHEAT CROP

Three points will be made by the farmers' representatives when they meet the railroad officials of the O. R. & N. and the Northern Pacific here Friday.

First, the farmers will ask for a reduction in wheat rates to the East and to the middle West. They declare the present rate is prohibitive of any shipping.

Second, they will ask for a rate on the O. R. & N. to Tacoma via Portland, which will equal that of the Northern Pacific. The farmers say wheat is always worth more in Tacoma than in Portland, and that farmers on the Harriman line have not an equal chance with those on the Hill roads.

While the Prohibs, like everyone else, object to adulterants and substitutes, they still advocate the substitute for beer instead of the real thing.
