

# INTERPRETS HOME RULE AMENDMENT

### ATTORNEY-GENERAL CRAWFORD HOLDS THAT CITIES MAY VOTE ON WET OR DRY REGARDLESS OF THE RECENT ELECTION RESULTS.

Declaring that the constitution of the state guarantees to every city the right to say by a vote whether it shall go "dry" or "wet", Attorney General Crawford yesterday afternoon rendered an opinion in which he declares that the city of Hood River as soon as its city council takes the proper legal steps may hold a local option election despite the fact that the county at the last election voted "dry".

The opinion was made in response to a request from Geo. D. Culbertson, of Hood River. The county of Hood River at the last election went "dry", but it was impossible to determine how the vote of the city on the question was owing to the fact that it lies in three different precincts. The Home Rule amendment has a clause in it providing that "cities within their boundaries shall be subject to the local option law", and it was the construction of it, together with the provisions of the constitution, on the subject that Mr. Culbertson desired.

The attorney general says that the clause must be construed with the constitutional provision guaranteeing to cities the right to vote on the local option question, and that in his opinion the Home Rule clause will not prevent holding a city election on the question providing the council by ordinance makes provision for such an election.

# JUMPED FROM THIRD STORY AND ESCAPED

When Detective Craddock pounded on his chamber door Francis was preparing to go to bed. One shoe was off, but he did not want to put it on when the detective entered the room.

After the leap the detective looked out of the window and saw Francis huddled on the ground, but when the officer arrived he had disappeared.

Francis is charged with having stolen a watch and \$200 from Chris Spreen, of 244 1/2 Yamhill street.

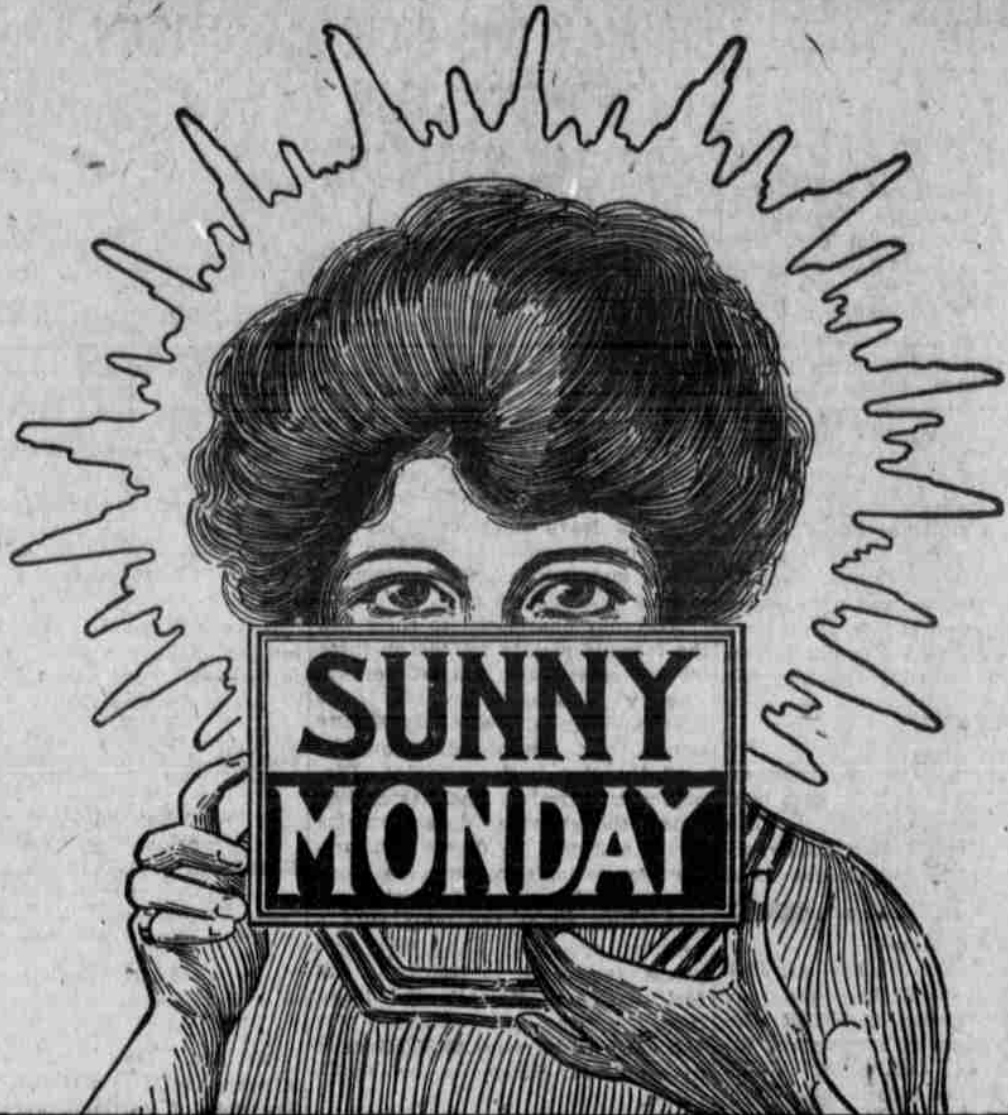
# Judge Taylor Dead.
