ASTORIA COMING TO THE FRONT.

This, Tuesday, evening the people of Astoria will give the opening banquet in honor of the Astoria Centennial.

The celebration will be held at the new hotel—the Weinhard-Astoria—not the Woldorf-Astoria.

It is a beautiful four-story building, erected by the Weinhard estate of Portland, with a roof garden.

With its annual water carnival, Astoria has gained quite a reputation as an entertainment center.

The enterprise celebrating the one hundredth anniversary of the arrival of the Astor ships is meeting with generous approval all over the state.

The completion of the new hotel and the taking up of the next step in placing Astoria on the map are all matters of public interest.

Salem people and the whole state will join in the recognition of this great historical event of white men landing for settlement.

DO NOT OVERLOOK DAIRY LEGISLATION.

This state needs a lot more dairy legislation to help the dairy interests.

We have now elaborate laws, with Dairy Commissioners and deputy inspectors.

But published statements are that we have 12,000 less dairy cows in Oregon, and are making 2,000,000 pounds less butter a year.

But we pay twice as much for it as we did before we had such laws, so the dairymen are not complaining.

But a lot more laws to create inspectors for the men who want jobs in the dairy department are badly needed.

Laboring people in Oregon who can be hired to milk cows at less than one hundred dollars per month are needed.

Butter is rapidly becoming a luxury for the rich and the commercial travelers at three-dollar a day hotels.

Cream with thousands of well-to-do families has long since been out of the question.

But give us lots more state and national legislation to spread on our slapsacks, that is what is needed.

Our government is rapidly hastening into paternalism and self-extending officialism.

OUR DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR.

This paper is asked to give a lot of space to the report of the Department of the Interior.

We are more interested in our own department of the interior.

To keep the family supplied with boiling beef and potatoes and buckwheat cakes is far more important.

By the way, a man who owes us two years' subscription should bring in those potatoes he promised.

If we held an office under the Department of the Interior we might give it a whole page of space in this paper.

We have yet besides a department of the interior that asks us questions sometimes and is hard to answer.

It is the mental machinery that has to be kept from getting squeaky, as well as the digestive.

ENGINEERS ARE SOLID FOR STRIKE

BY A PRACTICALLY UNANIMOUS VOTE DECIDE TO STRIKE UNLESS THEIR DEMAND FOR HIGHER WAGES IS COMPLIED WITH.

(UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.)

Portland, Ore., Dec. 13.—From sources considered as well informed concerning railroad activities, it was reported today that various railroads in the Northwest have been quietly preparing for a struggle if the railway engineers go on strike. Through their president, Warren Stone, members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers have delivered their ultimatum of "higher wages or strike" to the railroad managers at a conference in Chicago yesterday, and some sort of a reply was expected before tonight.

At a secret ballot of 27 per cent of the 37,000 engineers voted to strike if the demand for an increase was turned down.

In railroad circles it is common gossip that the railroads have enough reserve engineers on hand at the division points to operate the mail and passenger trains without the least delay. It is said that the work of placing the reserves at the points where they would be needed in case of emergency has been under way for the last two weeks in anticipation of a general strike.

It is said that the lines have reserve engineers at Portland, Spokane, Seattle, Tacoma, Umatilla, Oregon; Pocatello, Idaho; Huntington, Oregon; and other division points in the Northwest.

According to the stories circulating here, the Northern Pacific, Canadian Pacific, Milwaukee, Union Pacific and Great Northern have been particularly active in this connection.
