THE OPEN FORUM

South Commercial Street.

Ed. Journal:—There is much talk about South Commercial cement pavement not being satisfactory. Let me explain that the plans and specification for that kind of pavement were made by the Honorable Chairman of the Street Committee, G. Stolz, and were approved by the street committee and the city engineer as being just about perfect. Further desire to say the work was put down under the direction of the late Assistant City Engineer Jim Martin, who was accounted an expert. He inspected the material and the putting together of the concrete and the concrete itself and was on the job all the time. If it is not good work then the contractor is not to blame. Besides, dear Editor, when we get work done by a pavement building corporation that company gives us a written guaranty for a certain number of years. I am one of those who wanted bitulithic pavement on that street but was overruled by the street committee and other citizens. Now I have no guarantee that the pavement will last any time at all. Who can I go to for recourse? If it were bitulithic, the corporation would keep it in perfect condition for 10 years. As it is I may not have a street 10 months. Who can the dissatisfied property owner have any recourse to? Can we sue the city or the street committee if the work proves a failure? Kindly advise, —An Abutter.

(It does not appear as if the contractor was in any way to be held responsible. The city should open the street.—Ed. Journal.)

THE OREGON DIGEST

UP TO DATE, ISSUED

The Oregon Digest, a law book covering all of the cases cited in the Oregon state reports from the 44 to the 54 Oregon, has been printed and published by the Bancroft-Whitney Publishing company and the authors, Arthur S. Benson, deputy clerk of the supreme court, and Miss Effie Mae King, private secretary to Justice McBride, received their first volume yesterday.

The book takes up the Oregon cases as given in the state reports from the 44 to the 54 inclusive, all decisions prior to that being covered by Montague's digest. In addition it is provided with a complete table of cases covering all the volumes up to the 54th, showing where the decisions are reported, where they are to be found in the digest, also in Montague's digest, and where subsequently cited by the Oregon reports.

The book while not as exhaustive as some other similar works is complete and will be a most valuable asset to law libraries.
