MARKHAM PRESIDENT OF CENTRAL

CHARLES H. MARKHAM, WHO MADE GOOD ON THE OREGON LINES, WAS TODAY ELECTED PRESIDENT OF THE ILLINOIS CENTRAL.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Dec. 21.—Charles H. Markham, of Pittsburg, was today elected president of the Illinois Central railroad, as the successor of James T. Harahan.

Markham, in 1897, was made general freight agent of the Oregon lines of the Southern Pacific railroad. In 1901 he was transferred to San Francisco as assistant freight traffic agent and in 1904 was made vice president of the Houston and Texas Central, another Harriman road. In April, 1904, Markham became general manager of the Southern Pacific system and in June, 1904, he became vice president of the company.

In 1904, Markham left the Southern Pacific to become general manager of the Guffey Petroleum company at Beaumont, Texas. The elimination of Harahan from the Illinois Central is caused by operation of the pension rules of the company. Harahan will be 70 years old on January 12 next. He has been with the road continuously for 20 years. He was chosen head of the Illinois Central system after a spectacular fight in which Edward H. Harriman wrested the control of the road from Stuyvesant Fish.

May Join Roosevelt. New York, Dec. 21.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, who claimed that he thought he had discovered the north pole, will arrive tomorrow on the steamer George Washington. No committees of citizens or naval pageants will welcome him to New York as the explorer was received a year ago.

Dr. Cook is returning to spend the holidays with his family. Are Commissioners Now. Washington, Dec. 21.—The senate this afternoon confirmed the nominations of C. C. McChord and B. C. Meyer as members of the interstate commerce commission.

TO SETTLE BOUNDARY DISPUTES

SENATE AUTHORIZES THE PRESIDENT TO MARK THE BOUNDARY LINES BETWEEN THE STATES OF TEXAS AND NEW MEXICO.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Washington, Dec. 21.—Declaring "Calendar Wednesday" was "peculiarly sacred," Speaker Cannon today refused to permit the immediate consideration of a special message sent to congress by President Taft. Less than 80 members were present, in spite of the fact that it was "calendar Wednesday." Most of the session was taken up with a discussion of the Moon bill for a revision of laws relating to the judiciary.

Taft's special message recommended the adoption of a law authorizing the president and the state of Texas officials to mark the boundary between Texas and New Mexico. The message was read and its consideration suggested, but the speaker objected. The senate adjourned at 2 o'clock. It will reconvene January 5.

The senate this afternoon adopted the recommendation of the president authorizing him to settle the Texas-New Mexico boundary question.

CONGRESS ADJOURNS FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Washington, Dec. 21.—A resolution providing for a special rule for the consideration of the majority and minority reports of the Ballinger-Pinchot investigating committee by the house on the last Tuesday in January was introduced today by Representative Hitchcock of Nebraska.

Representative Hitchcock, of Nebraska, introduced a concurrent resolution in the house to prevent possible action by the interior department looking toward the patenting of Alaska coal land claims until congress shall have had an opportunity to consider President Taft's recommendations on the subject contained in his message to congress. The action is designed particularly to prevent patenting of the Cunningham claims.

The session of the house lasted until 3 o'clock, when adjournment was taken until after the holidays.

A roll call by sections this afternoon showed a list of 350 missing, but it is believed that many of the reported missing men are safe with friends, but have not yet been located. It will probably be several days before the extent of the disaster is learned, as the shaft and converging tunnels are choked with debris.

Among the dead is Assistant Manager Rushton, who perished while leading a party of rescuers. Rushton was not provided with the oxygen helmet, and succumbed to the noxious gas following the explosion.

The mine officials maintained that the complete reports will show that only 300 men were in the mine. Although the roll call showed 350 employees, the company's figures would indicate that 50 men were not on duty at the time of the disaster.

the engineers' action is expected to be based.

The conferences began here December 12. Since then the representatives of the engineers and the general managers have been negotiating and according to the railroad men today, they are no nearer a settlement than they were when they first announced that more than 95 per cent of the engineers had voted to strike unless an increase of 17 per cent in wages were granted.

"Unless Commissioner Neill is able to report something definite to me this afternoon," continued Stone, "we are going to act. The delay is intolerable. The best the railroads have offered us so far is an advance of 9 1/2 per cent. This was, of course, refused. All the other offers the roads have made in regard to the questions at issue also have been rejected."

The advisory board of the Brotherhood of Engineers has been hastily summoned to Chicago, and following the declaration of Stone that "decisive action" is to be taken, it is believed that the engineers are planning to take a firm stand.

"I am doing what I can to prevent trouble," said Commissioner Neill before his conference with the managers today. "I cannot at this time discuss the progress of the negotiations."
