CONCERNING THE TAXING OF ALL INCOMES

In view of the fact that the resolutions relative to the adoption of the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States permitting the taxing of incomes will come up for consideration the first of next week by the legislature the State Tax Commission today prepared recommendations in relation to the measure which will be submitted to both houses when the amendment comes up for action.

The amendment reads: "Congress shall have power to levy and collect taxes on incomes from whatever source derived without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration." The commission says that there are two reasons urged against the adoption of the amendment--that it would permit the levying of a tax on incomes derived from state, county and municipal indebtedness, making it possible to indirectly tax a state, county or municipality, and that the taxes on incomes should be reserved as a source of revenue for the state, and be levied by the several states.

Against the first objection the commission quotes a statement of Senator Root, of New York, in which he declares that it is not validly taken, and that the amendment would have no such effect as the objectors contend it would. The commission then proceeds to give its opinion that the prospects of the federal government, taxing indirectly states, counties and municipalities are too remote to occasion apprehension.

In relation to the second objection the commission says that, from the nature of state jurisdiction and the limitations under which a state income tax would necessarily be laid it would be practically impossible to levy a state income tax effectively at its source, and concludes with the statement that it believes that the federal government should be granted the right to impose a tax on incomes, as emergencies have arisen in the history of the country in the past, and are apt to arise in the future, when the government would be in need of such a source of revenue. The proposed amendment has been ratified in nine states, rejected by five and postponed by three.

FARRIS AND MURRAY WILL STAY SOME LONGER

Not guilty as charged, but guilty of assault with a dangerous weapon, was the verdict returned yesterday afternoon by the jury in the case of the State against Albert Farris, who was indicted by the grand jury on the charge of assault and robbery, being armed with a dangerous weapon.

Farris is a convict of the state penitentiary, and the charge against him consisted in making his escape from that institution, together with other convicts, and doing battle with the officers when surrounded at Buena Vista. Murray, another of the convicts who participated in the escape and flight, was convicted the other day on the charge of assault and robbery. Both will be retried by Judge Kelly Monday morning. The penalty in the case of Farris is from two to ten years in the state prison, and in the case of Murray is from three to 14.

The case of the Anderson Furnace Company against J. F. Priebe, an appeal from the justice court, is being heard today in the circuit court. The action was transferred in the justice court to recover a judgment for services in the making of a gasoline tank, and it was awarded to Anderson Priebe then took an appeal.

Frank Holmes is representing the plaintiff and Deputy Attorney Winslow is appearing for the defendant.
