## WILL CUT PULLMAN'S PROFITS

REDUCED RATES WILL SLICE OFF A MILLION AND A HALF DOLLARS YEARLY FROM COMPANY'S PROFITS.

Chicago, Jan. 21.—It is estimated that a reduction of \$1,500,000 in the annual revenues of the Pullman Company will be brought about by the reduced rate tariff for berths which goes into effect February 1.

Work on the new rate tariffs is rapidly nearing completion, and it was announced today, will be completed before the end of next week. The reduced rates is the result of negotiations that have been pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission for several months.

The reduction, which is country-wide, will mean a cut of 20 per cent for upper berths and between 25 cents and \$1, or 20 per cent of the total on its lower berths.

The new rates will be based on a charge of \$2 for a 12-hour run, except on some of the fastest trains, but the 20 per cent cut will apply to all upper berth rates.

The lines over which Pullman cars are operated include all the main lines of the United States, excepting New Haven roads and Great Northern and Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul systems.

## HE LIVED TWO YEARS WITH HIS BACK BROKEN

## DAMAGE TO CITY IS PLACED ABOUT \$50,000

Damage to the extent of \$50,000 was suffered by the city of Salem by the flood, which was occasioned by the heavier rains prevailing during the middle of the week, according to an estimate made by a committee of the council, which, when the waters receded, made a visit to the scenes of the washed out and partially destroyed bridges and damaged streets.

The flood was one of the worst, if not the worst, which has ever visited the city, and after the rebuilding and repairing work is undertaken it will be some time before conditions will be as good again as they were prior to the flood. A small bridge was washed out at Twelfth, one on Thirteenth, another at Fourteenth, the railroad bridge and still another at South Capitol street. While the South Winter street bridge was not destroyed, much damage was done to the body of it. The concrete of the Winter street bridge was damaged heavily, and it will require a large sum of money to put the two back

into condition. Considerable damage was also done to the streets of the city, especially those which were being paved. Mission street, for the improvement of which W. D. 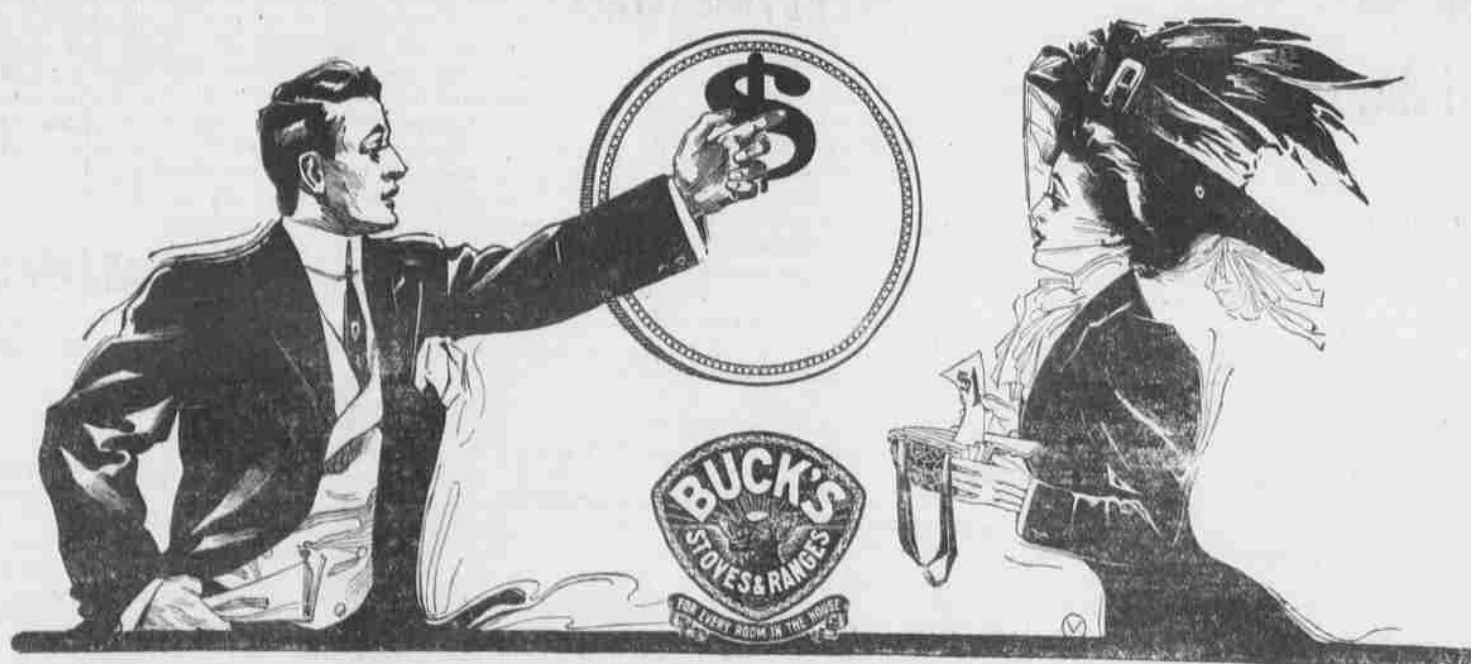
