FIRED FIVE SHOTS INTO PHILLIPS

GRAHAM PHILLIPS, THE AUTHOR, AND THEN TURNS REVOLVER ON HIMSELF.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Jan. 23.—David Graham Phillips, the author, was shot and seriously wounded at the Princess Club, on East 21st street, today by a man, who afterwards committed suicide by shooting himself through the head. The shooting occurred in front of the Princess Club. The assailant fired five shots into Phillips' body, using the sixth to kill himself. Newton James and Frank Davis, members of the club, were descending the steps of the building at the time, and caught Phillips as he was falling. The author gasped: "Some fellow shot me." He was carried into the club, and later rushed to Bellevue hospital. His condition is critical. Pending the arrival of the coroner, no attempt has been made to identify Phillips' assailant. Phillips' assailant was well dressed and of distinguished appearance.

PORTLAND GETS IN AND HUSTLES FOR PANAMA FAIR

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Portland, Ore., Jan. 23.—Oregon today went to the aid of San Francisco in her fight for congressional recognition as the official site for the Panama fair in 1915.

A wire from Portland to Washington, direct, was established and hundreds of messages were sent to Washington by business and commercial organizations and hundreds of private persons. The messages were all addressed to President Taft. The number of messages became so great this afternoon that the telegraph company handling the messages was compelled to cut through direct to Washington. The wire campaign will continue tonight and tomorrow. In addition to the messages sent to the president, a large number of the telegrams are being sent to Oregon
