GRINDS OUT ONE BILL IN HALF A DAY

HOUSE DOES STRENUOUS WORK, BUT THE PEOPLE WILL BE SATISFIED IF IT SPITS ON ITS HANDS AND MAINTAINS ITS SPEED.

Libby's house bill No. 1, to prohibit transportation of women for immoral purposes, passed by an unanimous vote.

H. B. No. 58, by Fouts, to authorize private propagation of trout and sale thereof. Carter showed that one clause gave the state game warden the power to indefinitely close a stream, "until fish shall mature." McKinney pointed out that the bill was unconstitutional in one respect, and with this hunch the bill must go back to the game committee.

No. 59, by Peterson, amends school law to levy \$10 per capita school funds, instead of \$7, as at present. Gill made the point that this was a bill to regulate taxation and could not be undertaken by the legislature under the new constitutional amendment.

Sent flying back to judiciary committee.

M. B. No. 125, by Abrams, amends incorporation law to include foreign corporations. Like all the other bills read today, it was found full of flaws, and sent back to the committee. Only one bill got through this morning, and that may be killed in the senate. The people breathe easier.

Resolutions.

This morning the house passed the joint memorial asking delegation in congress to fight for Oregon's share of reclamation fund.

McKinney resolution for 5000 copies of water laws to be printed. Adopted.

Mahoney resolution against lobbying. Carried.

Resolution for 30,000 acres to be reserved in Klamath reservation and Crater Lake forest reserve for use of Oregon National Guard. Adopted.

Resolution adopted inviting five judges of Multnomah county to appear at Salem Tuesday, January 31, to be heard on matter of two new judges to be created.

Resolution for two \$500 oil paintings of Governor Benson and Governor Bowerman to be hung in the state house were adopted. It will be amend-

ed in the senate to include Ben Selling, who was governor for 24 hours. A sweepstakes committee of five members to visit all state institutions until 1913, and employ clerks and experts to investigate all state institutions was passed.

The Astoria Centennial. The ways and means committee has already made up its mind to recognize the Astoria Centennial with a handsome appropriation. The Merchants' Association, now in session at Salem, gave the centennial a handsome endorsement Wednesday night.

More New Bills. No. 217, Chatten, regulates fishing on Willamette river.

No. 218, Pierce, amends fishing laws of Rogue river.

No. 219, Westerlund, amends code relative to salary of county recorder.

No. 220, Cattel, regulates packing oysters under sanitary conditions.

No. 221, Bryant, makes drawing checks without funds a felony.

No. 222, Bryant, to perpetuate liens for labor.

No. 223, Clyde, to create public labor exchanges.

No. 224, Gill, to provide bonds for roads on vote of counties.

No. 225, Rackleff, relating to right of railroads in canyons.

No. 226, Gill, amends law putting bear in same class as hard cider.

No. 227, Fouts, granting greater jurisdiction to juvenile courts.

No. 228, Clemens, amends code relating to badges of secret societies.

No. 229, Beals, boundaries of port districts.

No. 230, Mariner, authorizes state engineer to lay state highways.
