AVIATOR CURTISS GETS BUSY

DOES A NEW STUNT BY RISING FROM THE WATER WITH FLYING MACHINE JUST LIKE A DUCK.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] San Diego, Calif., Jan. 26.—Aviator Glenn H. Curtiss at 1:15 o'clock this afternoon rose from the waters of San Diego bay, made a flight of a minute and a half and landed on the water safely.

It was the first feat of the kind ever accomplished.

The flight was made in his specially constructed hydroplane, his biggest biplane, with pontoons in place of the usual wheels. The feat was performed for the war and navy department and is considered the most wonderful achievement so far in aerial navigation.

The jurors who had listened to the evidence in the trial of Mrs. Laura Farnsworth Schenk charged with having attempted to poison her millionaire husband, J. O. Schenk, stood 11 to one. It is believed that 11 men voted for acquittal.

Last night the Philodorian and Webster Literary societies, now organized into the senate and house of representatives of the state of Oregon, held a session in the University chapel, and heard the inaugural address of Governor Kellar. The governor was administered the oath of office by Chief Justice Patterson, and his version of the oath was extremely humorous.

Everything is done in a real legislative fashion, and the participants are receiving excellent training.

There is no school at the university today, on account of the observance of college prayer day, and Dr. Patterson gave the students a holiday. There will be chapel exercises in the morning and prayer meetings in the afternoon.

THE HONDURAS REBELS STORM THE CAPITAL

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Truxillo, Honduras, Jan. 26.—Following the capture of Ceiba by the Bonilla revolutionists, the supporters of President Davilla today are deserting to the rebel cause, and the overthrow of the Honduran president seems imminent. Preparations are being made by the revolutionists today to attack Puerto Cortez. Provisional President Bonilla is expected to join General Lee Christmas at Ceiba sometime today.

Ten men were killed and many wounded yesterday when Ceiba fell into the hands of the revolutionists, after a day of infantry and artillery fighting. No Americans were injured, or American property damaged in the engagement.

Velasquez Killed.

Tegucigalpa, Honduras, Jan. 26.—News has just reached here of a clash near San Antonio between the government troops and a body of insurgents, in which the revolutionists were defeated and General Velasquez, the insurgent leader, killed. Salvador is preparing to prevent the rebels from entering its territory.

CALIFORNIA SENATE ENFRANCHISES WOMEN

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 26.—By a vote of 23 to 5, the senate this afternoon passed Bell's proposed amendment to the constitution granting suffrage to women. If the assembly passes the measure it will be submitted to the people at the next general election.

TWO HORSE THIEVES GET THEIR "NEEDINS"

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] El Paso, Tex., Jan. 26.—Two horse thieves are dead and two others are badly wounded as the result of a battle with a sheriff's posse near Lordsburg, N. M. according to news reaching here today. The dead and wounded are believed to have been sympathizers of the Mexican revolutionists and were supposed to have been stealing horses for them. Several of the thieves escaped.
