STANLEY OF KENTUCKY ROASTS TED

SAYS HE GOT IN FRONT OF THE DEVIL TO HIDE HIM INSTEAD OF SAYING, "GET THEE BEHIND ME SATAN"—STANLEY A GOOD COOK.

Washington, Feb. 3.—Blister attack on former President Roosevelt, and on the steel trusts was made in the house yesterday by Congressman Stanley, of Kentucky.

"I insist that this lawless, defiant and pernicious monopoly be investigated immediately, and the guilty, no matter how powerful or how high, be brought to justice," he shouted.

Referring to the trust's obtaining of Roosevelt's presidential sanction for its absorption of the Tennessee Coal and Iron Company on the pretense of preventing a panic, he said:

"Never since the Prince of Darkness appeared to the Nazarine was there such a vista of evil and far-reaching dominion unveiled to the vision of God or man." The Saylor said, "Get thee behind me, Satan," but the hero of San Juan said, "I get in front of you, omnipotent devil.

"I'll stand between you and this colossal and law defying act of plunder; I'll paralyze the arm of justice and still the voice of popular clamor while you sandbag your competitor and loot a dominion in the south as rich and vast as an empire."
