DIAZ WANTS AMERICANS TO HELP HIM

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] Salt Lake, Utah, Feb. 8.—That President Diaz of Mexico, pressed by the revolutionists, is threatening coercion to American citizens to help him in suppressing the insurrection is the statement here today of Mormon Elder A. W. Ivins, who has just returned from the Mormon colonies in Mexico.

"We have been invited to take up arms and assist Diaz to crush the revolt," Ivins said, "and in some cases we have been threatened that unless we take a hand in the fight we will suffer ourselves. We all are American citizens, though, and will stand on our citizenship and refuse to participate in the quarrel!"

ARAB REBELS MAKE IT BUSY FOR THE TURKS

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] Constantinople, Feb. 9.—Fighting between Turkish troops and the rebels in the Yemen district has settled down to a dogged campaign which, according to advices received here today, promises to continue for months.

There are now about 100,000 Arabs and half as many Turks in the field, and the Turks are being steadily reinforced. Engagements are occurring daily, and the death roll has mounted up into the thousands. The Turks generally win in open fighting, but the Arabs are waging guerilla warfare with considerable success. The rebels expect to transform the Yemen district into an independent kingdom. If the Turks were left to fight it out with them undisturbed, ultimate defeat of the Arabs is sure, but if either Greece, Bulgaria or the Russians should declare war on Turkey there will be an excellent prospect of Arab success in the struggle.
