THE ROUTINE BUSINESS IN THE SENATE

The following house bills were passed yesterday afternoon by the senate:

- H. B. 210, Lane county delegation, to appropriate \$328,250 for the University of Oregon.
- H. B. 211, Lane county delegation, to appropriate \$175,000 for buildings at the University of Oregon.
- H. B. 212, Miller and Shaw, relating to fencing railroads.
- H. B. 213, Miller, to allow a bridge to be constructed across the Willamette river at Harrisburg.
- H. B. 214, Abbott, to create a retirement fund for the teachers of Portland.
- H. B. 215, Amme, to fix number and salaries of deputies in Multnomah county.
- H. B. 216, Bigelow, to provide for same refugees.
- H. B. 217, Bonebrake, to raise the salaries of officers of Benton county.
- H. B. 218, Neuner, relating to scalp hunters.
- H. B. 219, game committee, to protect lobsters.
- H. B. 220, Fouts, to protect ducks.
- H. B. 221, Leinenweber and Belland, to protect trout.
- H. B. 222, Chambers, to prevent shooting ducks from boat.
- H. B. 223, committee on insurance, to authorize the examination of insurance companies.
- H. B. 224, committee on insurance, to license agents of insurance companies.
- H. B. 225, committee on insurance, relating to life insurance.
- H. B. 226, special committee, to create state highway board. Laid on table.
- H. B. 227, Buchanan, relating to the election of directors of corporations. Failed to pass.
- H. B. 228, Buchanan, to authorize the attorney general to appoint as-

sistants. On motion of Bean the vote by which the bill was defeated was reconsidered and it was then passed.

H. B. 229, McKinney, to regulate and license automobiles. Laid on table.

H. B. 230, to protect ginseng industry.

H. B. 231, Westerlund, to raise salary of recorder of Jackson county.

H. B. 232, Abrams, to build armories and appropriate \$20,000 therefor.

H. B. 233, Steelhammer, relating to stock running at large. Laid on table.

H. B. 234, Abbott, to provide for night schools in district of first class.

H. B. 235, Derby, relating to terms of court in Hood River county.

H. B. 236, Clemens, relating to surety companies. Failed to pass.

H. B. 237, Bonebrake, to authorize Benton county to build a bridge across the Willamette river.

H. B. 238, Gill, relating to the sale of liquors.

H. B. 239, Bonebrake, relating to building bridges when two counties are concerned.

H. B. 240, Church, relating to killing deer in Union and Willowa counties.

H. B. 241, Belknap and Thompson, relating to salaries of officers in Crook county.

H. B. 242, Belknap and Thompson, to increase salary of treasurer of Grant county.

H. B. 243, Brooke, to raise salaries of officers in Harney county.

H. B. 244, Beals, to raise salaries of officers of Tillamook county.

PRESIDENT'S BROTHER IS DIAZ' FRIEND

"INTERESTS" CLASS INSURGENTS WHO PROTEST AGAINST DIAZ OVERRIDING THE MEXICAN CONSTITUTION AS, "MISGUIDED MEN."

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Feb. 17.—Henry W. Tatt, is today lined up with the supporters of President Diaz, of Mexico. Speaking last night at a dinner given by the Mexican society to Joaquin Casasus, President Diaz' special ambassador to the United States, Tatt, who is a brother of the president, said:

"I hope your country has not been disturbed over the publication of 'Barbarous Mexico' stories in American muckraking magazines. I trust that it has not done your country much harm or disturbed Mexican credit. I believe this society can do useful service in counteracting such statements, which I personally know are inaccurate."

Judge Alton B. Parker, who also addressed the society eulogized President Diaz.

"It is a great pity," he said, "that a few misguided men in all the millions of Mexico should attempt to undo the great work Diaz has wrought."

"The official returns," responded Senor Casasus, "between my country and the United States never have been more friendly than at present."

SAYS LABOR AND CAPITAL SHOULD UNITE

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Feb. 17.—Declaring that the day of unrestrained competition is past, and that the day of co-operation is in sight, George W. Perkins, former partner of J. Pierpont Morgan, is out today for the new era. Speaking at a banquet of the Williams alumni, he said:

This country, now is passing through a crisis greater than that of the Civil war. I think less competition will help to relieve the situation. Under present conditions it is almost impossible to live and prosper under the rules laid down by our forefathers, because conditions have changed.

"I think the time is ripe now for co-operative movement on broad and human lines of labor and capital and I believe each should meet the other half way."

M'LAUGHLIN HOME GETS AN APPROPRIATION

The bill appropriating \$1250 for the support of the McLaughlin home in Oregon City passed the house this morning. Representative McKinney, of Baker county eulogized the character of Dr. McLaughlin, whose picture hangs in the senate, as the one man who was always loyal to American pioneers, who settled Oregon. Mr. Belland, of Astoria, in voting for the bill, said he hoped some of the money would be used to scratch the moss off the backs of some of the Oregon City politicians. (Laughter.)

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE BILLS BOTH PASSED

The house this morning passed the two Agricultural College appropriation bills, senate bills 58 and 59. There were almost no dissenting votes. Mr. Bonebrake was congratulated on his success.



[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Portland, Ore., Feb. 17.—One little kiss—that was all, but it was enough to deprive an entire family of liberty for one week, which period of endurance may be stretched to a month.

As a result of that brief osculatory operation the scion of a well known East Side family is confined to his bed with diphtheria and his parents, brothers and sisters and the servants of the house are quarantined.

Seventeen young girls, students of a finishing school on the East Side are also in quarantine. Sixteen of these are in the best of health and are able to recount with much mirth the story of the kiss. The 17th has the diphtheria but she doesn't see the joke—yet.

There are no names for publication at this time, said Health Officer Wheeler today.

COMPROMISE ON HIGHWAY COMMISSION

A compromise was made last night by which the farmers will accept the Highway Commission bill as it passed the house, and house bill 224 is to be put through in its original form. It is known as the Gill County Bonding Act and provides that when a county issues bonds the petition shall state on what roads the money shall be expended. These roads are to lead to the principal market places. This is a great victory for the state grange, which opposed general bonding issues for state highways.
