

BIG BEND TO IMPORT ITS WIVES

EUGENE BECK GOING TO GERMAN TO BRING BACK SOME GERMAN GIRLS TO IMPROVE THE EASTERN WASHINGTON STOCK.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Spokane, Wash., Feb. 20.—The wheat growing country in the Big Bend probably will be the scene of a number of weddings in a few weeks, if the quest of Eugene Beck, a wealthy farmer for eligible brides in Germany succeeds. Beck is en route to New York, whence he will sail for Luxembourg March 2.

The Big Bend country is peopled by a large number of German farmers and housewives of the same nationality are in demand. Beck has volunteered to supply them. He intends to return as soon as a party of girls can be gathered together.

Shortly before leaving for the East, Beck said that American girls did not make good housewives, as they were too busy participating in politics and joining clubs, and for this reason native German girls were the choice of his friends.

HOLDING A CONVENTION IN HONOLULU

Honolulu, Feb. 20.—To bring the cities of the Pacific coast and the territory of Hawaii closer together, commercially and socially, is the object of the Pan-Pacific Travel Congress, which opened here today under the auspices of the Hawaiian Promotion committee.

Among the delegates to the congress are over 200 business men, representing commercial organizations of Seattle, Tacoma, Portland, Spokane, Butte, San Francisco, Los Angeles and other coast cities.

BUT HE PAID DEBTS LIKE A GENTLEMAN

REPRESENTATIVE MILLER HAS SALARY ATTACHED, BUT HE WAIVES SUMMONS, AND PAYS SMALL DEBTS SUED ON.

To be pursued clear to the state capitol and have his salary attached, almost at the last moment of the legislative session, and to be compelled to pay over \$40 and make assignments guaranteeing the payment of the rest sued for, in order to save enough out of his salary to pay his bills, was the experience last week of Representative Miller of Columbia county.

The suit was instituted against Representative Miller by E. W. Lewis, through Deputy Attorney Winslow Thursday, and three accounts were set out in the complaint. The first was a balance of \$75 on a note given by the defendant to the plaintiff, and the second and third were assigned notes, one amounting to \$50 and the other to \$47. Representative Miller waived the service of summons and paid over \$40 of his salary as representative and assigned enough of his salary as deputy district attorney to guarantee the payment of the remainder, and, under this compromise, was allowed to draw down the balance, which was necessary to pay bills incurred during the session.

THE PULLMAN COMPANY MAY AVOID MISSISSIPPI

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Vicksburg, Miss., Feb. 20.—The Pullman Car Company is today threatening to discontinue car service in Mississippi, as the result of a jury verdict allowing Miss Pearl Morris \$15,000 damages because negroes were admitted to a sleeping car in which she was riding. The company has appealed, declaring that if it loses the case, Pullman cars will be closed while running through this state.
