 London, Feb. 21.—English experts today are growing more and more alarmed over the far Eastern plague situation.
 "In spite of some skeptics," says the London Medical Standard, "it may be doubted if, unless means can be devised to stamp out the infection, an epidemic of the most virulent type cannot be expected."
 "That pneumonic plague has obtained a foothold in East Anglia is unquestionable. So far there is no evidence of its spread to other parts of England, but the past history of the plague contains many instances where the full force of the virus has been developed very slowly."

THE FRIENDS ADVOCATES OF PEACE

PASS RESOLUTIONS ASKING THAT THE PANAMA CANAL BE NOT FORTIFIED AND ADVOCATING UNIVERSAL PEACE.

At the Salem Quarterly meeting (business session) of the Friends' church held last Saturday, the 18th, at Salem, Rev. John F. Hanson, of Portland, introduced the subject of national and international peace by offering the following resolution.

"As members of the Friends church we protest against the proposed expenditure of the public funds for warlike preparations. And in particular we protest against the use of such funds for fortification of the Panama Canal, and we urge the government of the United States through our representatives in congress to procure by international agreement the neutralization of the whole Canal Zone."

And said in part that war might be prevented by disarmament easier than with armies and navies. This, he said, had been proven by our relations with Canada. And the three-fold tie of commerce, religion, and scientific development between this country and Japan, and China is a much surer grounds for peace than any fortifications could be.

The Friends church throughout civilized nations has always had much to do with the great peace movement, and they are looking forward to the day when our nation will cease to expend 70 per cent of our national funds for the building of an army and navy.

After an extended discussion of the subject, the meeting unanimously instructed the clerk to sign the resolution in behalf of the meeting of 450 members, and forward a copy to each of the members in congress, and offer a copy to each of our papers with a request that our action on this very important subject be published.

INJUNCTION WAS MADE PERMANENT

JUDGE GALLOWAY HOLDS THAT ONE LAW IS GOOD UNTIL ANOTHER IS MADE AND THE FIRST ONE REPEALED.

Yesterday, as was told in The Capital Journal, Judge Galloway, at the suit of E. H. Flagg, chief clerk of the senate, issued a temporary injunction restraining the committee appointed by the senate to revise the senate journal, from interfering in any manner with Mr. Flagg in revising the same. Last night he made the injunction permanent.

Attorney J. H. McNary appeared for Mr. Flagg and Attorney-General Crawford and Deputy Van Winkle for Calendar Clerk Ritter, W. G. D. Mercer and John P. Hunt. These three had been named in a senate resolution as the persons to revise and correct the senate journal. Chief Clerk Flagg, relying on the Kykendall law of 1899, which named the chief clerk as the person to do this work, brought the injunction.

The case was opened by Attorney Van Winkle, who took the ground that the senate had charge of its own journal, and could do as it pleased with it, and that one legislature could not pass an act which would bind another. This self-evident fact he backed up with decisions from the orange blossom state of Florida, and the cyclone-breeding Kansas, along with opinions from Blackstone, Kent and the highbrows of ancient times, and even to old Cicero.

McNary admitted the axioms mentioned by the attorney, but said the legislature could only do away with the Kykendall law by repealing it, by another law made by both houses. That the senate could not do it by resolution. No legislature could make a law (unless it was in the nature of a contract) which any subsequent legislature could not repeal, but it was the law, and must be obeyed until repealed. The legislature could not pass upon the constitutionality of a law. That was for the judiciary. Their way to do business with a law they thought unconstitutional was to repeal it. Five legislatures had accepted it as law, and had obeyed it.

The recent legislature made Columbus day a legal holiday. All future legislatures are bound by that law, until one of them repeals it. Should a special session be called in the month of October it could not do business on Columbus day. It could not even meet on Columbus day and pass a law repealing the act that made it a legal holiday. It would be bound by it to that extent.

Judge Galloway took Mr. McNary's view of the case, held that the Kykendall law was constitutional and

made the injunction permanent. General Crawford gave notice of appeal, but said the matter might be dropped, and, if so, he would so notify the court some time today.

land was released, the grand jury declining to indict.

"Encouraged by this act," they say, "he came proudly back amongst us and in a few months repeated the offense on the person of a little white girl for which he was arrested by the state authorities but when our court set, our district attorney made haste to dismiss him, claiming lack of jurisdiction."

Shortly afterwards Grover White was found dead in a road with a bullet hole in his heart and Carl Logsdon arrested and after remaining in jail nearly a year was declared not guilty.

Indian Woman Cruelly Murdered.

"Some time during the month of January, 1909," continues the petitioners, "Polly Dick, an Indian woman, was found near her home from which she had been taken and foully murdered. Both of her arms were broken and various bruises on different parts of her body bore silent witness to the fact that she had been cruelly put to death. This case was investigated by the coroner's jury under the direction of the local justice of the peace but the officials paid so little attention to it that it was over a year before the costs of the inquest were allowed by the court. It was about this time that John Woodman, a man about 50 years old and very feeble, was assaulted by his son-in-law, Abe Logan, and almost killed. His arm was broken and he was bruised and beaten over his head and body in a manner most shocking to contemplate. For this Logan was arrested, but again the wisdom of the district attorney was only manifested by the haste he displayed in discharging the case."

Other Cases.

The petition then discusses in detail the cases of Ira Strong who has upon occasions been handy with the knife; several assaults which occurred on the public highway and for which no arrests were made; of Robert Felix who shot and killed John Spencer and Martha Metcalf and then killed himself; of Felix, son of Robert, who murderously assaulted Odell Lane and who is now under bond for trial; further offenses of Warren Brainard and Ira Strong, who made a vicious attack on his grandfather and for which he was never molested.

Must Have Relief.

The petitioners allege that the federal authorities do not administer justice appropriate to the offenses and that in many cases no investigations are made at all, and that the state authorities, despite the fact that the attorney general has rendered an opinion that they have jurisdiction of the Indians in criminal cases, decline to act, declaring the state courts have no jurisdiction. They threaten that unless the governor can give relief, to take the law into their own hands and take a tooth for a tooth and an eye for an eye.
