JAPAN IS IN NO CONDITION FOR FOREIGN WAR

Tokio, Feb. 23.—Impeachment of the Katsura ministry in the lower house of the national diet was prevented here today only by the narrowest margin. Accused of contributing greatly to the growth of socialism and anarchy in Japan by undue severity, the Katsura cabinet saved itself from censure only by a last minute combination with the Seiyukai party, thus securing a bare minority.

Public interest in the charges against the Katsura government has been intense following the execution of Denjiro Kotoku and his fellow socialists and the lower house was jammed today when Nationalist leader Inikais arose to attack the cabinet.

Fearful of a popular demonstration, however, the government ordered the house cleared during the debate, and only the members heard Inikais flay Katsura and his associates. For a time it looked as though the people would resist expulsion, but they were finally overawed by a strong guard.

GOVERNOR APPROVES SOME BILLS

Believing that the raising of county salaries is a matter for the people to pass judgment upon, and in view of the fact that most of the measures passed by the legislature raising the salaries of county officials provide that they shall be referred to the people, or are so drawn that the people can apply the referendum to them, if they desire, Governor West this morning approved all the bills raising the salaries of officials in the counties of the state.

There are 22 of these measures in all, and they provided for the raising of salaries of every kind of an official, from constable up. None of the raises were large, however, and, because of this, and the further fact that it is a question which the governor thinks the people of the counties themselves should decide, and which they may decide for themselves by the use of the referendum, he has approved all the bills.
