

### CLAIMS LOWE MANUFACTURED THE SECURITY

Upon a complaint signed by C. F. Van Allen Deputy District Attorney Winslow today directed that a warrant be issued for the arrest of Charles S. Lowe on the charge of obtaining money by false pretenses.

The offense is alleged to consist in Lowe prevailing upon Van Allen to go security on a note for \$200 by falsely representing to him that he had a \$500 interest in a contract for the conveyance of a certain tract of real property. Prior to signing the note Van Allen had Lowe execute a contract giving him the equity held in the property as security and this document will be the principal evidence introduced against Lowe to prove the charge preferred against him.

When the note fell due Lowe failed to meet it and Van Allen paid it. After paying it he made an investigation as to his security and found that Lowe had never had an interest in the land as represented by him, and at once took steps to arrest him.

### WHAT IS DOING AT WILLAMETTE

The basketball team of Willamette will begin some hard work today in order to prepare for the game with the Washington State College next Thursday evening.

The game promises to be a hard, fast one and will probably be the last one of the season for Willamette. The local university has not been defeated and the team is confident of winning from the Pullman bunch. The Washington State College will make a tour of the Oregon colleges, playing O. A. C. first tonight. She will play Oregon at Eugene two nights in succession and the next night will meet Willamette. The scores made against the Washington team will show the relative strength of Willamette and Oregon. Oregon won from Pullman on her northern trip and beat every other team in Washington with the exception of being defeated in one of its two games with the University of Washington at Seattle. Willamette has won from O. A. C. in two games and defeated the fast Mt. Angel college team twice and Dr. Sweetland thinks that Willamette can defeat Oregon on her own floor.

Austin Plegel and his gang of student laborers are making rapid headway on the track and baseball field. The baseball diamond has been en-

tirely covered with clay and rolled lightly in order to mash the clods. The next rains will pack the clay and a heavy roller will smooth it off splendidly. The track will probably be completed in two weeks. There will be men out running just as soon as it is completed. Dr. Sweetland is considering whether or not to purchase the fence and grandstand of the League grounds on Asylum avenue and place them on the Willamette campus. In case he decides not to do so, the building of a new fence and bleachers will be started soon.

### THE REASON FOR THE SUIT HAS CEASED

Contending that all the grounds which may have existed for the bringing of the action, have ceased to be, Attorney General Crawford today filed a motion with the clerk of the circuit court in which he asks the court to dismiss the case of Daniel E. Powers against F. W. Benson, secretary of state, and State Treasurer Steel.

This suit was brought by Powers for the purpose of restraining Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle from drawing his salary on the ground that the law did not provide for the creation of such an office. The state demurred to the complaint but it was over ruled by Judge Harris, of Eugene, but an injunction was never issued.

The attorney general now takes the position that the appropriations made by the legislature two years ago have been exhausted and that the last legislature through a bill created the office of assistant attorney general and also provided for his salary and that, therefore, there are no grounds left for the further prosecution of the suit.

### NO DECISIONS IN THE TRUST CASES

Washington, Feb. 27.—Although Attorney-General Wickersham and other members of the government were present, expecting decisions in the tobacco trust and other important cases, the U. S. supreme court rendered no decisions this afternoon.

### Thirty Froze to Death.

Astrakhan, Russia, Feb. 27.—Thirty men who formed the crew of an ice boat on the Caspian Sea, were found today frozen to death. Their ice boat had plunged into a crevasse and though the men escaped the water, they froze before they could reach a fire.
