He recommended to the commission that certain improvements be made and the company advises it that it has plans looking to the making of them under way.

CANNOT GO TOO FAST OR TOO FAR

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] Bellingham, Wash., March 14.—Persistent rumors are current in military circles to the effect that during the last month there has been an exodus of Japanese from the Pacific coast. From an outside source information was given out in Bellingham recently that every city on the coast has experienced a marked decrease in its Japanese population. It is conceded that the emigration might be due to commercial conditions. The report was not based upon the large exodus of Japanese from Bellingham.

Active preparations are being made to place the second company, coast artillery reserve corps of Bellingham on a footing to meet an emergency. Orders from the war department have been received by Lieutenant Kindall, commanding the company, to make requisition for ordnance, commissary supplies and everything needed for field service, sufficient to fully equip 100 men.

Pharmacy Examination

The state pharmacy board is holding an examination today in the senate chamber of the state house. There are about 40 persons taking the examinations.

Railroad Is Tied Up

Somerset, Ky., March 14.—With freight traffic on the Queen and Crescent practically at a standstill as a result of the strike of its white firemen, many Kentucky towns today are facing a fuel famine. The freight yards here are congested and passenger trains are arriving hours behind schedule time. Acts of violence were reported today at many points along the line.

Stops All Mining

New York, March 14.—American manufacturers and mine owners received word today that the Mexican government has prohibited for an indefinite period the importation of high explosives into the republic. The order is said to have caused almost complete suspension of mining operations in Diaz' realm.

Asks Release of Americans

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] Washington, March 14.—The state department this afternoon asked the release of Edward Blatt, of Pittsburg, and Henry Converse, of Los Angeles, Americans, imprisoned at Jaurez, Mexico, declaring they were arrested on American soil. The demand was presented at the American embassy here. The officials of the embassy recently stated positively that the men were arrested in Mexican territory.

Raised Age of Consent

Sacramento, Calif., March 14.—Behind closed doors the assembly today passed Butler's age of consent bill, raising it from 16 to 18 years. The doors remained closed while Tibbitts' bill to make six months to period between intercounty and final divorce decrees instead of a year was passed. Absent members were arrested and brought in to vote on the bill.

Passengers on the steamer San Diego, which arrived from Lower California today, declared that the officers of the Yorktown paid brief courtesy visits to the Mexican officials at Ensenada, and that the gunboat then sailed south for an unknown destination.

ADVOCATES BETTER AND MORE PLAYGROUNDS

L. H. Weir, field secretary of the Playground Association of America, with headquarters at New York, and who is making a tour of the Pacific coast states in the interest of the association arrived in the city this morning and is today conferring with State Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman as to the advisability of launching a campaign for better playgrounds for the schools of Oregon, and for resorts of recreation in general.

Mr. Weir has just completed a tour of California where he did much work in behalf of the association. He succeeded in interesting the school and city authorities of the larger cities of that state in the movement, and plans were set on foot looking to the creation of resorts and more playgrounds for the school.

Mr. Weir desires to interest the people of this state in the same subject, and arrangements will probably be made for him to lecture on the subject and to meet those interested in the work and perfect organizations, the objects of which will be larger and better playgrounds for school children and the creation of park and resorts of recreation in the cities in the state.
