

CITY DADS GET DOWN TO PAVING

SESSION LAST NIGHT WAS DEVOTED ALMOST ENTIRELY TO MATTERS OF STREET PAVING MANY IMPROVEMENTS ORDERED AND BIDS CALLED FOR

Realizing that the city is progressing—that it is forging ahead by leaps and bounds—and desiring to keep pace with it, and realizing that the street improvement season is here, property owners from various portions of the city last evening submitted petitions for the paving of the streets upon which they own property. The property owners in the city in general have for some time been in just such a mood—want to go ahead and progress, and not backwards—and every meeting of the council for the last couple of months has been flooded with petitions for street improvement work. Specifications and petitions for the carrying out of some of the improvements petitioned for some time ago were adopted last evening, and also the recorder ordered to advertise for bids, and it begins to look now as though that after while the people will be granted their wishes, and that before the season for street improvement is over.

Streets to Be Improved.
Specifications and plans for the improvement of East State street, from the Mill creek bridge to the penitentiary grounds, were adopted, and the city recorder directed to advertise for bids. The same action was taken regarding the improvement of Liberty street from Court to North Mill. Both specifications call for bitulithic.

Specifications and plans for the improvement of Cottage from Court to Mill creek with bitulithic were also presented, but referred to the street committee.

There were two petitions for Elono pavement—Market street from Seventh to the Oregon & California railroad tracks, and D street from Twentieth to Winter street. Both were referred to the committee on streets.

Plank sidewalks were ordered installed on the west side of the Fair Grounds Road, and also on Mission street.

After Copplin's patience had been severely tried by the Jap's continuous teasing to "hit me right there;" the Yankee boy hit the Nipponese—hit him right on the tip of the nose. Blood came, and with it the Jap came back for more. Copplin, being a

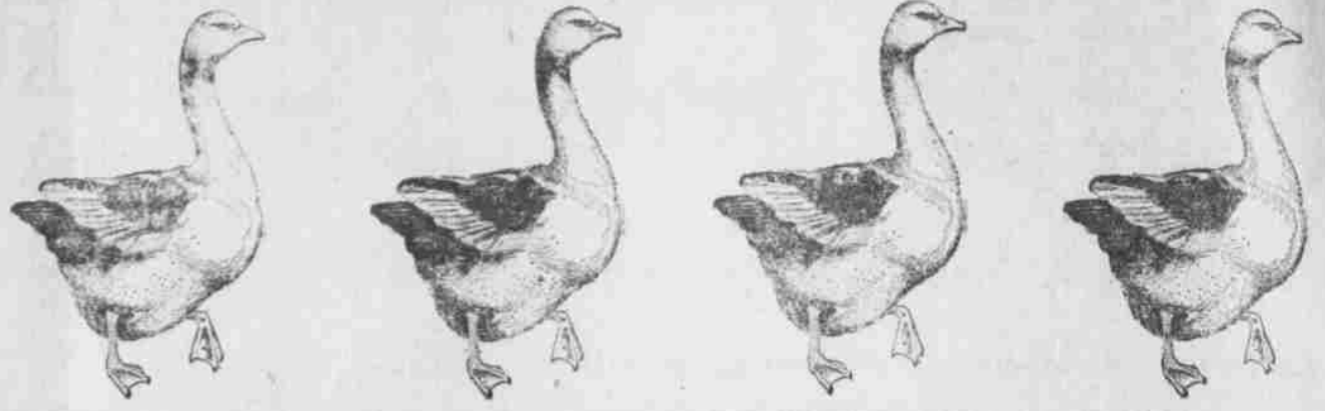

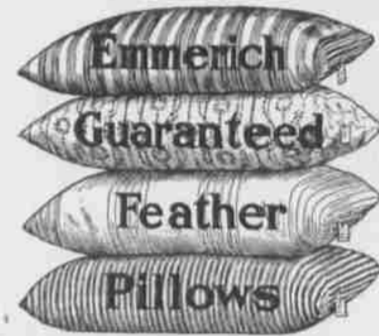
