

MADAM SHERRY IS COMING BEST RECENT COMIC OPERA

The one big red letter event that looms up on the local theatrical calendar is the coming of "Madame Sherry" to the Grand Opera House on Saturday evening, April 8.

Of all musical comedy successes of the past decade, not one can equal the artistic and financial triumph scored by this dainty French vaudeville in New York this season. Without a solitary exception all the metropolitan critics joined in proclaiming "Madame Sherry" the gem of musical productions. The same has been the case in Chicago, St. Louis and all other cities where the piece was offered on its trip to the Pacific coast, and in San Francisco it has just closed the most successful engagement of three weeks in the history of that city, hundreds being turned away at every performance.

Originally a French creation which ran in Paris for two years, "Madame

One number in particular, "Every Little Movement Has a Meaning All Its Own", is being played, sung and whistled wherever music is known. It is coming here in all its glory, and with that perfect cast which includes Oscar Figman, Ann Tasker, Mary Quive, Lottie Kendall, Cheridah Simpson, William Cameron, Harry Benham, Harold Rehill, Edward Elkas and a score of others.

HESITATED BETWEEN PEN AND HIS WIFE

DEXTER ROBERTS AT FIRST INCLINED TO STAY IN THE PEN, HE EVIDENTLY THOUGHT—"HOME AIN'T A NOTHIN' LIKE THIS."

Whether to return to the penitentiary and serve out the balance of his sentence, one year, or avail himself of a conditional pardon which made it incumbent upon him if he desired to enjoy his liberty to return to his farm and live with his wife was a question which puzzled Dexter Roberts yesterday afternoon, but after considerable hesitation and upon being assured that the condition did not make it necessary for him to live with her forever, he availed himself of the pardon.

Dexter Roberts is a man of years, has reached the half century mark. On May 15, 1909, he was sentenced from Morrow county to a term of four years in the state prison for obtaining money under false pretenses. He has served three of those years and yesterday through the efforts of his wife and friends, he secured a

conditional pardon from Governor West. When he read the document and found that the condition was that he must return to his farm and live with his wife he balked. He wanted to know of the governor if that meant that he must live with his wife forever and upon the governor nodding assent, replied that he had only a year to serve and guessed he would return to the penitentiary.

Wife Wins Him Over.
His ungratefulness did not appeal to Governor West and he grabbed up the document and summoning the wife, stated that her husband did not seem to appreciate his liberation. Roberts finally learned that if he lived on the farm with the wife for a year that his sentence would be completed and that then he could go wherever he pleased, but he still hesitated which to choose, life with the wife or the state prison. Irritated by his hesitation the governor said: "It is up to you; either comply with the condition or go to the penitentiary." The wife then pleaded with the husband and finally he decided in favor of liberation and reached out for the pardon and slouched out of the room, the wife leading.

WILL SHIP THEIR WOOL TO LONDON

EASTERN OREGON WOOL GROWERS SAY PRICES ARE HIGHER THERE THAN HERE BECAUSE ENGLAND HAS NO PROTECTIVE TARIFF ON WOOL.

Portland, Ore., March 31.—Big wool growers of Eastern Oregon and Washington have determined to ship their wool to London direct, in the hope of securing better values for their product than in the United States, according to information reaching here today.

The woolmen assert that prices are better in the English market on account of the absence of tariff. They claim that the tariff talk set up by American woolen mill owners is an attempt merely to force down the buying price of wool while making no reductions on the price of woolen cloth.

Shearing has commenced on the sheep ranges but it will be several weeks before the clip is prepared for shipment.
