

MACLEAY MAKING CHANGES

WALDO FARM TO BE SOLD—OLD HOME TO BE HISTORICAL SPOT—SOCIAL TO NEW-COMERS NEXT SATURDAY NIGHT.

There will soon be no Waldos living in the Waldo Hills. The old Waldo homestead has remained in the family since its settlement in 1843, and the house and barn are among the historic buildings of the state.

The present owner, Miss Edith Humason Waldo, has decided to sell her ancestral acres, and a syndicate of Eastern men are figuring on its purchase, as a tract to be divided into small farms and orchards. Miss Waldo is endeavoring to retain the old house, and will keep it as a show place in connection with the Oregon Historical Society.

Believing in cultivating a "get-together spirit," and wishing to aid the many new-comers to become acquainted with the older settlers in the neighborhood, Macleay Grange has inaugurated a series of public socials.

The next one occurs on Saturday evening April 15 at Macleay hall. The local Grange talent will be assisted by a dramatic reader, Miss Henrietta Beatrice Honey, from Portland. Mrs. Clara H. Waldo, master of Macleay Grange, has charge of the program, after which a chicken pie supper will be served for 25 cents.

From West Stayton.

The West Stayton irrigation project is attracting a great deal of attention. The company is spending a great deal of money on the ditch. It is reported that they have also invested some money in land. The Kenworthy place, formerly owned by John W. Porter was first bought and they paid \$5,000 down. The Harry Doe place of 154 acres was also secured and it is reported \$400 was paid down. The company also bought 40 acres of two men at \$100 per acre, for which they paid cash. Mr. Hartog who made a trip to Europe for the syndicate to bring out the Holland colony is enthusiastic over the project. He says they will have 500 families located within a year. Irrigation has never been given a practical demonstration in the Willamette Valley. It is not believed that it will be of any great value in growing grain crops, but for large and small fruit and vegetables, it will be very valuable. The late potato crop can be planted, and depended on the fall rains to make a crop, while irrigation water can be turned on and the crop matured a month earlier. Many fall potatoes are now lost by not ripening. This will be obviated by irrigation. It will be discovered that two crops are possible with many varieties of vegetables and small fruits.

From Croston.

There is a great deal of development work going on in the neighborhood of Croston and Hall's Ferry. What was known as the Slough Road has been changed to Riverside Drive. A great deal of grading has been done between the school house and the Ferry. Crushed rock will be put on, so that there will be a fine road from the city limits to Croston. There is some talk of changing the name of this place to Croisan, in honor of Hon. E. M. Croisan, who owns a great deal of land up this way, and has been very active in securing right of way for the Oregon Electric. A 12-wire suburban telephone line is being built to connect with the city. It will be one of the best farmer lines in the state, and subscribers will be connected with the Salem exchange.

Ed. Journal: In reply to Mr. Lafky's explanation why three months have rolled around and not a dollar of street work has been let, allow me the privilege of a little space in your paper to say that Mr. Lafky's explanation does not explain. The former city council and the former street committee worked under the same charter, and they got something done. We lost the whole month of March, and could have had two or three streets paved. Ferry street was ready to go ahead with months ago and it is a fact that they have not even got the property assessments made. Our city is slow enough without such delays. When an alderman's attention was called to it he investigated, and found that no notice of assessment had ever been prepared, and the matter had been overlooked by the street committee. His excuse throws all the blame on the charter, and he is to blame himself. On Front street, where the people petitioned last year for a pavement he wanted time to consult the corporations. There is so much of this con-

sulting business going on the people are getting tired of it. Why do these aldermen want to consult so much with representatives of the big corporations? If we do not get something going in the way of improvements, which the people have asked for, and are willing to pay for, we might as well go out of business. Better recall some of these gentlemen and put the corporation attorneys in their place.
