

# WILL OPEN COAL MINE IN OREGON

MEDFORD SUN OF APRIL 15 TELLS OF THE BIG VEIN AND SLENDID QUALITY OF THE COAL SOON TO BE PLACED ON THE MARKET.

This morning work will start on what will be one of the greatest, if not the greatest resources of Jackson county. It is not less than the opening up of the gigantic coal veins which lie within five miles of Medford.

H. H. Graham, Peter Young and Lawrence Le Baron, three capitalists from Chicago, have secured a lease from Colonel J. F. Mundy of the Cascade Coal company ground, a tract of 2100 acres which lies between the 401 ranch and the summit of Roxy Ann. Every detail of this important deal was completed yesterday and the lessees arranged for men with which to begin work today.

Last evening at the Hotel Nash, the three lessees, Colonel Mundy and J. M. Morris, the real estate dealer, gave a Sun representative a detailed account of the deal and the merits of the property.

The work at first will consist of the pumping out of an incline 2000 feet in length, to open up the vein, knock down coal and make room to increase their force as rapidly as possible. The coal is opened up by the incline and the lessees will be enabled to take out coal from the start, probably enough to make the operating expenses at least for that portion of the mine.

This tract of 2100 acres is but a small portion of Colonel Mundy's holdings, his other groups being the Sunnyside and Western. He has prospected his land around the base of Roxy Ann for a distance of 13 miles, by driving tunnels of various lengths from 125 feet to 4000 feet and has found that in the entire distance not only one but three veins of coal. The top one is nine feet in thickness, 75 feet deeper is another of seven feet and 150 feet farther down is another five feet in thickness.

These are blanket veins having a drop of from five feet to 75 feet, which means that the tunnels are inclined slightly and is the reason that at this time pumping or siphoning out the water is necessary.

At various places in the thirteen miles the coal crops out and at all places thus far prospected it is easily found.

It is the highest grade of coal on the Pacific coast, being superior to the Rocks Springs, Roslyn and Nantmo.

Pendleton reports the rainfall this year less than half the normal.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Berkeley, Cal., May 3.—Seventeen co-eds of the senior class at the State University broke up a rehearsal on the stage of the Greek Theater this afternoon, declining to allow male members of the class to put their arms around them. The objection of the senior girls followed an attempt of Fred Carlisle, the coach, to have the co-eds of the "Baby Doll" chorus of "The Hop King," the commencement week play of the class, fall into the arms of male chorus men at the conclusion of the dance.

Claiming that they were not acquainted with the owners of the arms, never having been introduced to the men, the co-eds declined the proposed first-meeting familiarity.

Coach Carlisle and members of the caste attempted to smooth over the strike of the co-eds, but they remained obdurate and the scene was temporarily dropped. The girls say they came up to the exigencies of the production by appearing in short dresses and the proposed familiarity was altogether lacking in dignity. The feature will be dropped for the present unless Carlisle is able to bring the men and women of the chorus closer together.
