### MAY FORCE AMERICA TO STOP IT

CONSTANT STREAM OF PLEAS FOR PROTECTION FROM AMERICAN CITIZENS AND SPREAD OF INSURRECTION MAY FORCE THE FLAG ACROSS THE BORDER.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] Washington, May 3.—That the Mexican situation today is nearer to American intervention than at any time since the revolution began is the opinion here as a result of the action of President Taft today. Before going to Baltimore to attend the peace congress, the president sent for General Wood and conferred with him at length on the outlook. The constant stream of pleas for protection by American citizens in Mexico, the certainty that in every state, except Chihuahua, the revolt is growing, and the danger that it will become so serious as to be beyond Mexico's control is admitted to be giving President Taft most serious concern. He has been informed that at least 75 per cent of the Mexican people favor the insurgents, and reports of secret service men prove that not a single section of the republic is free from rebellion. While no official admissions are being made, it is generally known that the administration is extremely anxious over the outlook and has grave fear that the Stars and Strips may yet be forced to cross the Rio Grande.

Washington, May 3.—To prevent a repetition of the controversy growing out of the arrest and removal of John J. McNamara from Indianapolis to Los Angeles in connection with the Times dynamiting, Representative Korbly, of Indiana, today introduced in the house a bill amending the extradition laws.

Korbly's amendment provides: "That no person shall be surrendered, under pretense of being a fugitive from any state or territory by any court, except a court of record; nor without the alleged fugitive having an opportunity to notify friends, secure the service of counsel or test the efficiency of extradition proceedings by habeas corpus or otherwise."
