

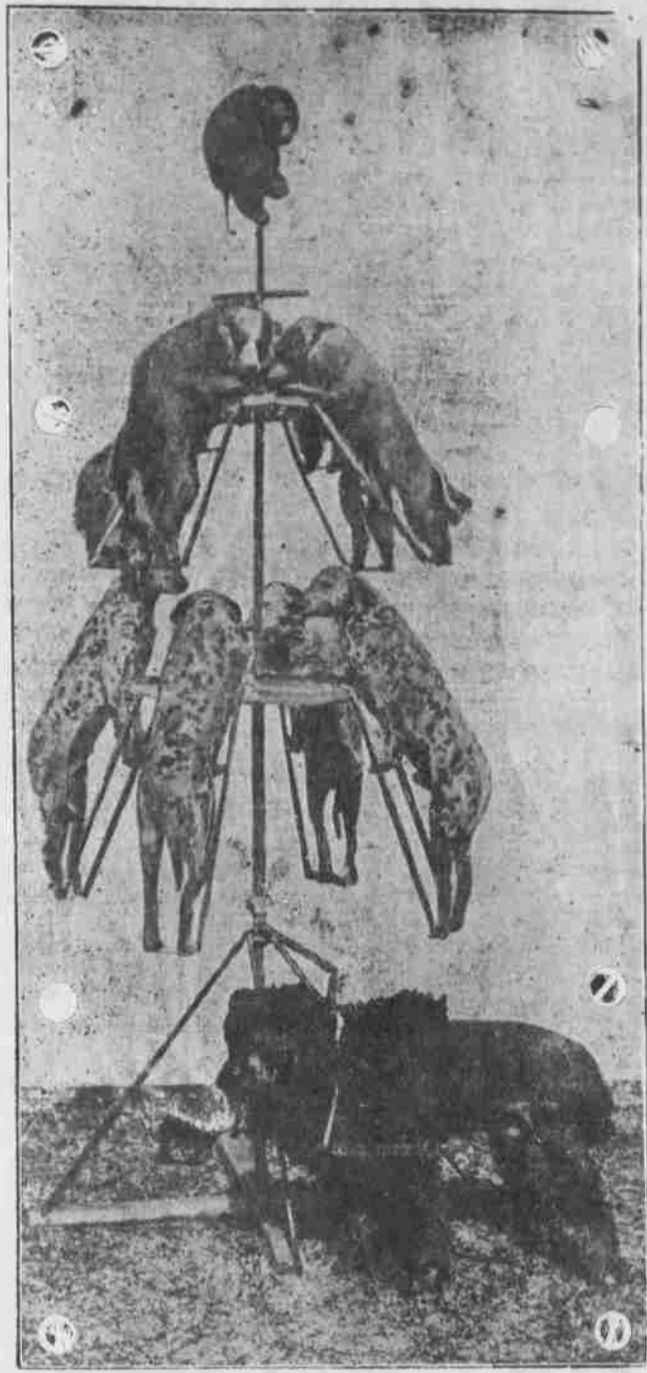
# THE CIRCUS CAPTURES THE CITY

**BIG HORSES IN PARADE ARE SPLENDID, AND CAUSED MUCH COMMENT—GREATEST COLLECTION OF ANIMALS EVER SEEN IN THE WEST.**

If the big parade of the A. G. Barnes circus is any criterion of the class of the performance then in truth it must be the best show of its kind which has ever visited this town. A finer display of stock could not be seen anywhere, and the local horse enthusiasts went into raptures over the big six-horse team which led the parade. The wild animals which were seen in the many cages were all that the press agent claimed, and more. Ferocious denizens of the wilds were grouped about men and women trainers, who sat in the cages as though they were among so many house pets and seemingly not noticing the danger which surrounded them. It was noticed with pleasure the fine condition of all the animals which tends to make a performance better than the ordinary. Mr. Barnes may well be proud of his attraction, which, from appearance, outranks anything which has been seen here for many years.

One of the most spectacular and thrilling acts which has ever been presented to any audience in the history of "the big top" is that given by Herr Louis Roth with his group of Royal Bengal tigers and Nubian lions. These magnificent animals which were bought from the Maharajah of Ceylon at the expense of \$25,000, and brought to this country for Mr. Barnes, are alone well worth the price of admission.

We have often seen a trainer enter a ring and the wild animals, for some reason or other, seem to drag and lose interest, but not so with Herr Roth. Every instant there is something new which almost makes one's hair stand on end, so near does he come to being torn to pieces by the animals striking at him while his back is turned or when he wants them to perform. One false move and it means certain death with these snarling creatures who are only awaiting a chance for an opening. But there is a chance. There is that snap and ginger of one who is fully competent to handle any situation, and the dexterity with which he separates these beasts when they start to fight in the arena proves what great control he has over these animals, heretofore claimed to be untamable. Placing his head in the lion's mouth, sitting on the flank of another, while it is lying down, and showing to the audience the cruel, sharp claws which are concealed in the growth of hair on its feet, while the other beasts are grouped around him, with every opportunity to leap on his back and crush him to the

earth, yet they dare not move for fear that they too might make a slip, and it would mean a beating within an inch of their lives, if not certain death.

The exhibition is merely a display of what absolute fearlessness and confidence can do with these blood-thirsty monsters of the wilds. Roth never overstepped the bounds, which has caused the death of so many of the less cautious animal trainers. There will be another performance at 8 p. m. tonight, which will be the last time this remarkable attraction can be seen this year.

### IT IS LAWFUL TO TREAT ON THE STREETS

That the giving away of liquor gratuitously, purely from motives of hospitality, provided the gift is made on the streets, and not in a building, and not for the purpose of evading the law, is not a violation of the local option law is in substance the opinion of Attorney-General Crawford, and he has so advised George Spencer, a justice of the peace at Gates, who believes that the law should be enforced more rigidly at Gates. Spencer says that, while the village of Gates is dry, there is considerable giving away of whiskey on the streets. The loggers, he says, send to Portland and buy liquor by the gallon, and some times they become generous with it, and he wanted to know if the law could not be made elastic enough so that they might be reached. The attorney-general holds that the gift must be for value and though in the form of hospitality, but a mere pretense of the violation of the law, to make the giver subject to prosecution under the local option law.

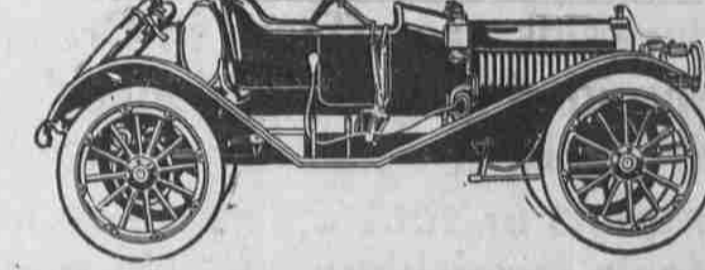
